

## SURBER ESCAPES

### He and Another Prisoner Break Jail.

#### BELIEVED THEY HAD ASSISTANCE

#### Surber Held as Ponca for Trying to Sell a Forged Mortgage -- Still at Large.

Roy Surber who was in custody in Ponca, charged with trying to obtain money on a forged mortgage, and whose former fraudulent practices in Wayne and mysterious disappearance from here two years ago are well known, broke jail with a companion prisoner Monday night, and at this writing has not been apprehended. Tuesday morning's Sioux City Journal contains the following account of the escape:

"The Sioux City police last night were notified by Mrs. A. H. Maskell, wife of the sheriff at Ponca, Neb., to look out for Sam Douglas, alias 'Doc' Douglas, and Roy Surber, two prisoners who effected a jail break at 6 o'clock last night at Ponca.

"The jail had been left alone in the afternoon, and when Deputy Sheriff W. H. Oady went there at supper time to feed the inmates he found the birds and doors open. Douglas and Surber were the only prisoners in the jail.

"County Attorney Kingsbury, speaking over the long distance telephone, said that the prisoners must have been assisted from the outside. The supposition is that some one with a key which fitted the lock to the jail turned the trick.

"The prisoners could not have been gone long before they were missed. Sheriff Maskell is lying ill at his home with typhoid fever; a Deputy Sheriff Oady immediately organized a searching posse. Last night the surrounding country was scoured; but no definite trace of the men could be found. The probability is the men who liberated them had a vehicle in waiting and hurried them to some seclusion.

"Douglas is a prisoner who is awaiting trial for stabbing John Bush, of Ponca, and is charged with assault with intent to kill. Surber was in jail on a charge of uttering a forged instrument. This is the second time Douglas has escaped from the same jail. The other time he had not been out very long before he was apprehended."

## STANTON SUICIDE

### Jens Pederson Hangs Himself While Despondent.

#### CARRIED OUT PREVIOUS THREAT

#### He Was a Plasterer and Bricklayer and Native of Denmark-- Leaves a Family.

Jens Pederson, a plasterer and bricklayer of Stanton, suicided by hanging himself in a shed on his premises in that town Sunday night. Sunday evening he visited with his married daughter in town and on returning home told his wife he was going to a farm to finish a job of plastering. The next morning when his wife went out to feed the pigs she discovered his dead body suspended from the roof of a shed. Pederson was 62 years old and a native of Denmark. Besides his wife he leaves a son and daughter. He was subject to long periods of despondency, during which he had often threatened to kill himself. No other reason is assigned for the rash act.

## BROWN TAKEN TO PRISON.

United States Marshal Tracy of Sioux City, gives the following account of the taking of W. E. Brown, convicted banker, to the Anamosa penitentiary: "He seemed to be very anxious and nervous, and while we were at Farley, where we had been delayed for two hours, he nearly became hysterical in his haste. Time and again he would ask when we would reach the penitentiary. Toward the end, however, his nerve went back on him. Just before reaching Anamosa I told him we would be there soon, and he almost fainted. I thought I would have some trouble with him, but when I told him to brace up and bite on the bullet, he pulled himself together."

"From that time on he seemed in a trance. He did whatever I told him to without a word, and when I came to say goodbye to him, he just shoved out his hand without saying anything. The man looked rather sick and his nerves have gone to pieces."

## IN REGARD TO HOG CHOLERA.

One of Wayne county's most successful hog raisers, who has had wide experience in the treatment of hog cholera or swine disease, says that he has found the best way to prevent hog cholera or to stamp it out of a herd after it has begun its deadly work, is to feed oats on a floor or platform where dirt and filth will not become mixed with food, and use very little if any corn and especially avoid feeding new corn when the disease is in the neighborhood. Keep close watch of the herd and if one refuses to eat seclude it from the others and if it refuses the second meal best thing to do is to starve him a few days and if he don't cure then kill the hog. Use crude carbolic acid diluted with water and scatter it over the hogs and premises with a whisk broom and don't be stogy in the use of the disinfectant, as it is one of the greatest preventatives of disease that can be used. Don't allow the animals to become constipated, keep bowels active by feeding oil cake as constipation will surely breed disease. Above all things keep premises clean and furnish animals plenty of good, pure water to drink.

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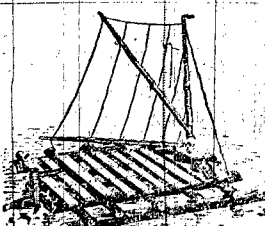
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How to Build a Raft

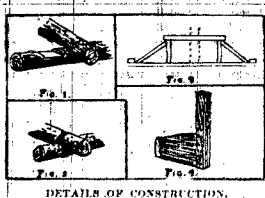
It isn't always handy for a boy to get boards, match the joints, and make a boat that is watertight, but almost any boy can get some logs and pieces of timber sufficient to lash together and make a raft.



THE RAFT WHEN COMPLETED

four joists are made fast with spikes, on which a deck of boards is nailed. At one end of this deck a step bench is made, in which a mast will be held.

The mast is stepped through a hole cut in the top board of the bench and occupies the position shown by the dotted lines in Fig. 3.



DETAILS OF CONSTRUCTION

made from two pieces of board held between two uprights, to act as a rudder post. These are fastened together as shown in Fig. 4, and an opening near the top is formed by setting pieces of wood the thickness of the rudder blade boards between the two front strips and nailing them fast.

A tiller can be cut from a piece of stick and the handle end planed at the edges to round them.

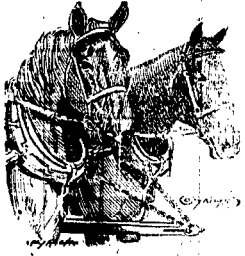

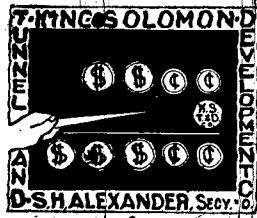

TEXT OF THE RUSSO-JAPANESE AGREEMENT MADE PUBLIC

Text of Compact Given Out in Russia Same Day Mikado Puts It in Effect—Japanese Army Warned Not to Criticize Settlement.

The text of the treaty of peace concluded by Russia and Japan at Portsmouth, N. H., Sept. 5 and signed by Emperor Nicholas and the Emperor of Japan, has been made public.

GOES TO DIXIE LAND.

PRESIDENT MAKES A SOUTHERN TOUR.

Keeping Promise Given More Than a Year Ago, Roosevelt Takes a Trip South—Has Now Visited Every State in the Union.

In accordance with a promise given more than a year ago, President Roosevelt started Wednesday on an extended trip through the States of the South, intending to visit all of the Atlantic coast States, Alabama, Arkansas and Louisiana.

After tentative arrangements for the trip had been completed, the epidemic of yellow fever broke out in New Orleans, one of the principal points of the President's itinerary. He was urged by many of his friends that he ought not to visit New Orleans at the time so troubled, lest he be exposed.

The officials of New Orleans the President suggested that, if he preferred, he should postpone his visit to that city until a later date. Assurances were given him, however, by Mayor Behrman and by officials of the marine hospital service that at the time of his proposed visit to New Orleans danger from yellow fever infection practically would be out of consideration.

At Richmond the President made an address in Capitol Square and was entertained at luncheon by the citizens and taken for a drive to points of interest in the city. In his speech the President said in part:

I trust I need hardly say how great is my pleasure in speaking in this historic city. In speaking of the State, the State that has so often been the center of a larger proportion to the leadership of the nation for on the honor roll of those American worthies whose greatness is not only for the age, but for all time, not only for one nation, but for all the world, on this honor roll Virginia's name stands above all others.
