become the dominant party of the
country.

If our editorial brethren find any-
thing in the columns of the Herald good
enough to clip and use without giving
proper credit, we have no kick coming,
but it may be possible that some other
fellow may have seen the same thing
in our columns and has branded you as
thief and we do not want that stigma to
attach to any Nebraska editor, so we
believe it is best to give credit where it
belongs.

A great deal of praise is being given
certain members of congress and of the
senate because they have at a late day
declared themselves as being in full ac-
cord with the railroad rate views of the
president. Are they deserving of any
particular praise because public senti-
ment has forced them to take this
stand? We like the fellow that has
stamina enough to do the right thing
because it is right and because he wants
to do right, and have small respect for
the fellow that jumps into the "band
wagon" because he is afraid of getting
his brains knocked out if he persists in
opposing the wishes of the crowd.

The editor of a Nebraska paper re-
cently went off on a vacation and left
his paper in charge of a minister while
he was gone. During the minister's
stay in the sanctum the following letter
came from a Tooker subscriber: "You
knew it—I well I paid my subscrip-
tion the last time I was in Columbia
City. If I got any more such letters as
I received last week, I will come down
and mail hell out of you." The minis-
ter answered: (I have been trying to
mail that thing out of the editor for ten
years and if you will really come down
and mail it out for me, then, my dear
sir, I have twenty members of my own
church that I will have you operate on.)

Judging from the amount of money
already expended and the progress re-
ported in making the Panama canal the
American people are going to have to
put up at least a half billion of dollars
before the big ditch is ready for ships
to pass from ocean to ocean. Some-
times in reading of the money being
paid out for various things we are a lit-
tle bit impressed with the idea that this
canal job is not entirely free from graft,
in fact it is pretty difficult to find an
enterprise conducted by national, state,
county or municipal ownership in
which there is not some element of
graft. There is something about our
people in which they seem to think that
anything done by governmental control
ought to have in it some most excellent
private snags and every man having
anything to do, in enterprises of this
kind generally tries to beat the public
and in many instances succeeds ad-
mirably.

Director of the United States mint
has of late been gathering some statis-
tics as to the rise and value of farm
lands in various parts of the country
and comes to the conclusion that they
are good properties to hold onto. He
says all good land in Iowa is worth \$100
per acre and gives the reasons for this
conclusion. One of the principal rea-
sons assigned is the rapid increase in
the world's production of gold, hence
the practical fall in value of the same;
that is, the greater the volume of gold,
it being the unit of value as a means of
exchange, the more of the precious
metal it will take to purchase a given
quantity of any of the commodities of
life and as land is the source from which
these are derived a continuous upward
movement in prices will result as long
as the quantity of gold is on the in-
crease. The fact that plentiful money
brings low rates of interest invariably
causes money to seek the safest invest-
ment and land being accepted by all
people as the safest of all securities it
will go into the purchase of lands, and
demand for any article always enhances
prices. He finds during panics from
whatever cause, the man whose money
is invested in good lands never becomes
a bankrupt and this lends confidence in
it as a safe investment and is causing a
greatly increased demand for its own-
ership. He says that for twenty-five
years good corn lands in Illinois have
advanced on an average \$5 per acre per
year. He cites that a few years ago
when Illinois lands had reached the \$75
mark people said prices had reached the
limit but since that time these same
lands have doubled in value. What he
says of Illinois and Iowa is equally ap-
plicable to Nebraska, Kansas and the
Dakotas and thousands of men who
have kept tab on these matters can tes-
tify to the truthfulness of the findings
of Mr. Roberts.
