"In Unity There is Strength."

Has in the case of the organization known as the Wayne Cream Association proven to be a truism. Prior to last June the farmers around Wayne sold their cream to members of the Creamery trust at such prices as organized greed felt inclined to pay. They were not only given very unsatisfactory prices but were subjected to tests that they felt were not just by any means. Talk of all kinds was indulged in by the producers but that was all until finally a mass came forth to lead them out of the wilderness away from the corporation vultures who waxed fat in purse while the patient farmers milked the cow. To P. M. Corbit more than any other in the organization that has brought additional dollars to its membership and caused at least one of the trust breed much trouble.

The Association of cream producers was formed and began business June 16th, 1906 and from that date to Dec. 16th, 1906 have sold 131,844 pounds of cream which has produced 47,367 pounds of butter fat that has averaged 25 cents per pound to the farmers at its station in Wayne. The expense of handling this business has been one cent per pound of butter fat paid to the man who operates the station and an additional expense of \$90 for rent, etc. for the entire six months. The Association held a meeting at the court house, Saturday and were so well pleased with results that a vote of thanks was unanimously given to P. M. Corbit the efficient secretary and A. P. Goward the manager of the business. While the Association has met with unexpected success, its path has not been one strewn with roses. Every device known to trust manipulators has been resorted to in order to disrupt the organization but without effect. The trust has sent its paid emissaries to each individual member of the organization and have offered them prices in excess to what they were receiving in order to get them to break away, but up to the present they have been unable to make a break in the ranks, because the farmers fully realize that the entire object of the trust is to break up the Association and then down will go prices to the old level. The cream is sold at present to an independent Creamery and is now being sold at 31 cents per pound of butter fat and the buyer accepts the weights and tests of the Association's manager at this point and seems to be highly pleased with the deal. At first the Association sold its product to an independent but under spurious promises from an agent of the trust was finally induced to change and sell to the Kirschbaums of Omaha and for a time all went well until the trust thought they had the farmers in its clutches and then not only were prices lowered, but tests were declared incorrect and the devil was to pay all around, but instead of the Association quietly submitting it got up and told the trust to go hence and found another buyer and with the lamp of experience as a guide to its feet it looks today as though the Wayne Cream Association was here to stay and is likely to prove a guiding star for other communities in the work of co-operation. The membership of the Wayne Association is composed of a body of farmers whose combined wealth would make some of the would be members of the Creamery trust when put in comparison look like thimble cents, and they are thus abundantly able to go independent of the so called trust and if

other communities will show the same spirit of independence and stick-to-itiveness independent creameries can be sustained and operated regardless of the wishes of the trust.

LIVE STOCK EXHIBIT.
All Nebraskans will be interested to know that the exhibit of fat cattle sent to Chicago from the State University farm was again successful in winning several of the highest prizes offered by this, the largest live stock show in the world. Of the nine steers exhibited by our University, six were prize winners, one of them a nine-months calf, bred on the University farm, winning the Grand Angus Championship over all ages, and another, the College Championship over the cattle of all breeds and ages exhibited by the various state universities and agricultural colleges. Had Mr. Turner, who came from H-refordshire, England, to judge the grade steers and award the Grand Championship, judged the pure-bred steers, the University would have won on "Baby"—a two-year-old Angus (pure-bred)—the same honor that came to Challenger in 1903, viz., the Grand Championship plum. "Baby" under the English judge in the College Classes was placed ahead of the two steers that had defeated him under a Chicago judge and was pronounced by the English judge the best steer in the show. This, however, was after the Grand Championship had been awarded to a steer from Illinois. "Baby" was sold to "The Fats" department store at fifteen cents per pound live weight, the top price of the show for single individuals, bringing for beef \$375.00. On the yearling steers entered in the carcass contest, the University of Nebraska won both first and second prizes, which is a strong testimonial for the system of feeding practiced at our

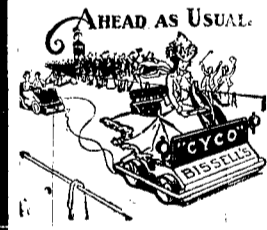

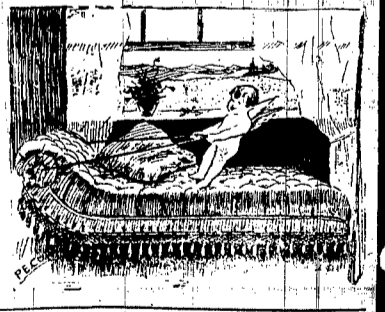
