We are pleased to learn that Andy Cloyd is meeting with much success as intermediate teacher at Tilden. She and her sister were industrious, well-behaved students who always did their best in every class. Their success proves as in all cases that judicious hard work wins the battle.

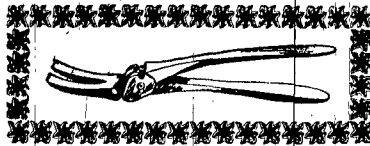

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### VOTE FOR IT.

The HERALD is sincerely of the opinion that the best interests of Wayne will be subserved in the adoption of the Initiative and Referendum, and we believe the enlightened voter will vote for it. Every good citizen desires that Wayne always be a live town and that a spirit of unity and progressiveness be maintained at all times. Factional strife is to be avoided and all means to promote harmony is to be utilized. We will always differ as to policies and means to a desired end. But while we strive for principles we are all ready and anxious to stand by a majority rule. By means of the Initiative and Referendum we can make our voice heard for or against any proposed measure. Such a method is both fair and sensible and right in line with the popular doctrine of "a square deal." We don't care who proposes a plan, just so the plan is all right. Under a direct voting system, questions are settled decisively, for the time being at least, and if the question disposed of has but little merit it will not likely come up again. Wakefield, Nebr., March 26, '07.  
DEAR SIR:—On the 3rd day of May last, our saloons closed surrendering the license issued by the out-going Board of Trustees. For the last half of the year our town has been practically dry.

Our merchants have enjoyed as good a trade as any previous year in the history of our town, in fact our receipts of merchandise have been one and one half million pounds in excess of the previous year and our people are so well pleased with our experiment that the tax-payers of 5-7 of the taxes paid by the voters are asking a continuation of the present condition.

Our Public Schools will run the full 9 months on a 17 mill levy and we will be able to pay salaries in full by the close of the year. At the last meeting of our School Board it was decided to advance the salaries of the teachers about 10 per cent above what they have been receiving.

In regard to the financial standing of our village, I will give you a few facts and figures taken from our village records. The village was turned over to the present Board, practically with an empty treasury. During the present year, we have made the following improvements:

To offset this debt we will turn over to the village \$2108.06 worth of permanent improvements and I will say that approximately 1/3 of the estimated indebtedness we provided for in the present levy which is 21 mills as against last year when we had two saloons. Vote for it. Nothing can be more fair than to have questions such as licensing the saloons decided by majority vote. It is unfair to have the council decide it and at the same time place their business in jeopardy. To settle it by a vote of the council opposed to license when the majority of the people wish high license to rule. Suppose that the first ward would show a majority of 75 in favor of license and the second and third wards would secure a bare majority for no license, the result would be that the no license policy would prevail, when really the city, on account of the first ward, would show a majority for license. This would defeat the will of the majority. The Anti Saloon people want fairness, and do not want to work any trick on the opposition, and are absolutely sure that the adoption of the Initiative and Referendum is as fair for one side as the other, and ought to receive the unanimous approval of the saloon side of the controversy. If there is any difference the adoption of this measure gives the saloon people a much better opportunity than without it, but they are too blunt to see the point. It is not likely that a special election will be called if the proposition carries as the expense of a special election is always saddled upon those petitioning for the submission of the ordinance unless the measure passes by majority vote, in which case the city pays the expense.

From the Discipline, page 403, adopted at the last session of the General Conference.

"It can never be licensed without sin. Planting ourselves upon the bed rock of that solid proposition, we declare that no citizen and no christian has a right by example, by voice, by influence, or by his ballot to contribute to the establishment or to the maintenance of the ungodly license policy as applied to the liquor traffic.

We are unalterably opposed to the enactment of license laws, because such laws are wrong in principle and ineffectual as a means of restraint. We will not be content with any system of levying tribute upon this corrupt traffic. We demand its entire destruction, and to the accomplishment of this result we pledge our best endeavor.

The church should be always and everywhere the courageous, hopeful and unflinching foe of this enemy of all things pure and good, and should continue its warfare until, like the crime of slavery, the saloon has become a thing of the past."

The pronouncements of other churches are quite similar, hence you may be sure that a minister is always opposed to the saloon. Were he not opposed to the saloon he would be untrue to his commission. Every preacher who is true to his platform will do all in his power to eradicate the saloon. He who thinks the churches and preachers are all wrong will do well to read the following from the pen of Abraham Lincoln:

"The liquor traffic is a cancer in society, eating out the vitals and threatening destruction, and all attempts to regulate it will not only prove abortive, but will aggravate the evil. There must be no more attempts to regulate the cancer. It must be eradicated, not a root must be left behind; for until this is done all classes must continue in danger of becoming victims of strong drink." Respectfully,
