remembered, however, that marked success is attained here only as it is attained in other countries, that is by intelligent and energetic work. This being a new country, many more opportunities offer here than in the United States, but those who expect success to wait upon them unsolicited will fail as well as there. What these islands need is a class of sturdy pioneers such as made that great empire lying west of the Mississippi river to blossom as a rose men with willing hands, honest hearts and a small amount of capital. The statement so often made to the effect that a white man can not labor in this climate is not true. Those who are afraid of a little sunshine can find some excuse for not laboring in any country. As Major General Leonard Wood who is also a very eminent physician says: "there is nothing in the climate of these Islands which prohibit long residence here." A moral life, with plenty of hard work will be found to counteract, in most cases, the so-called demoralizing effect of the Philippine climate.

There are some 60,000,000 acres of agricultural lands in these islands only 5,000,000, acres of which are subject to individual ownership. The price of this land is fixed at \$2 per acre, and can be readily secured owing to the fact that the Government is more than anxious to see it under cultivation. The price of land suitable for hemp cultivation if purchased from private parties is from \$1 to \$2 per acre. Lands under cultivation costs about \$3.50 per acre. Eorest land cost about \$3 per acre.

The forest area of the Philippines, including all public and private woodlands, is estimated to be 48,113,920 acres. The area of private woodlands held under valid title is far below 1,000,000 acres. The timber cut and marketed in these Islands during the past year has been entirely insufficient to meet the local demand. It has been necessary to import millions of feet of American pine and redwood and of timber from Borneo and Australia.

When one considers that over forty million acres of tropical forests and that the species now listed number six hundred and seventy five, he begins to see what this wealth must be. But he needs to live here for a time, to push his way thru the forest where three or four trees are growing in a space needed by one for its full development, to see trees of the most magnificent hardwood rising eighty feet without a limb and tossing their topmost twigs a hundred and fifty feet above his head before he gets any clear idea. Then he may wander into some unpretentious house and find a circular table with a top of a single piece.

NOTE—The above is the first of a series of letters to appear in the HERALD, relative to the resources and possibilities of the Philippines. They are written by a party now living at Zamboanga, and are, we believe, both authoritative and reliable.

Humphrey Democrat: A new law which has been on the statute books for some time, and which has not been enforced in this state, will, in the future, be enforced to the letter. We refer to the law regulating the sale of poison fly paper. According to law nobody but a registered pharmacist has authority to sell poison fly paper, but heretofore most all grocery and general stores have sold it. Mr. Christoph of Norfolk, a member of the state pharmacy board, was in Humphrey one day last week and informed our merchants of the existence of such a law and warned them against a further violation of the law. So in the future the drug stores are the only places you will be able to procure poison fly paper, and if you should send the children for it, it will be necessary for you to also send a written request for the same, as the law forbids selling anything of a poisonous nature to minors.

### WAUSA HONORS WAYNE

#### Brings Her Improvement Club to The Chautauqua and Does Herself Proud.

The Wausa Improvement Club Ben Asuaw II, the "Rare old Bird," clowns, women, children and kids all turned out in response to the invitation from the Wayne Commercial Club to visit that city today and help them in their festivities. In all they were about seventy-five in number, some which had gone down on Wednesday. The day was an ideal one and that they all enjoyed themselves was evident by the broad smiles which illumined each and everyone's countenance. Reaching Wayne the Club formed in line for parade headed by the Wayne Concert band followed by Ben Asuaw II and his guide. Then came the six Roman guards with their gold helmets and spears, dressed in full uniform. LITERARY LOG ROLLING.

How Some Famous Authors Bought to Advertise Themselves.

The examples cited by Francis Griffith in his article on "The Comedy of Literary Log Rolling" in the Strand Magazine arouse some suspicion as to their absolute authenticity, but are amusing enough whether true or not. Sainte-Beuve increased the circulation of his books by insisting upon fighting a duel in the rain with an umbrella over his head. Gerard de Nerval used to be seen in the streets of Paris leading a lobster by a string. Mme. Krudener, the author of "Valerie" and the friend of Alexander I. of Russia, made the fortune of her novel by calling at all the Paris shops and asking for various articles of dress "a la Valerie." Of Victor Hugo and of Alexandre Dumas the elder the following stories are told:

Nor was the great poet ashamed to roll his log even at a funeral. He seized the opportunity at the obsequies of one of his own sons. It happened that on the way to the cemetery the procession passed a traveling menagerie, and the lions, for whatever reason, stopped roaring just as Victor Hugo was in front of their cage. His companion, a minor poet named Pelleport, drew his attention to the fact. "Master," he whispered, "the lions recognize you and hush their voices. The king of beasts is silent in the presence of the king of men." Victor Hugo bowed and turned the matter over in his mind. Then, after meditation, he said: "Pelleport, that was a happy thought of yours. Couldn't you write something about it?" And Pelleport wrote a sonnet about it, and the fame of the master stood on a higher pinnacle than ever.

And finally there was the case of Dumas, of whom it may almost be said that his whole life was an advertisement. Some one once said of him that his vanity was such that he was capable of getting up behind his own carriage in order to demonstrate that he had a negro footman in his service. He certainly did many things almost as absurd as that in his restless pursuit of reclame. One of his delights was to clothe his noble proportions in a uniform and to embellish the uniform with decorations to which he was not entitled. He even went so far as himself to design the uniform in which he fought—or, rather, did not fight, for he arrived after the fighting was all over—in Garibaldi's army, and he achieved a tremendous advertisement by conducting a well known actress to a court ball to which she had not been invited. He got another advertisement by allowing himself to be sued for nondelivery of a feuilleton. He was utterly in the wrong, and he lost his case, but he kept the court in roars of laughter while he explained his literary methods and the nature of the distractions which had interfered with the fulfillment of his contract. But the best of all his advertisement was attained when the announcement appeared that M. Alexandre Dumas would write the last chapter of a forthcoming romance sitting in a shop window, for all the world to see how it was done. One can understand that that sort of advertisement would suit the authors who are also interested in the sale of hair restorers. They almost owe it to the public to exhibit themselves in this way, killing two birds with a single stone. But for the author of the "Monte Cristo" to do it was surely the ne plus ultra of the comedy of log rolling.

The Hanging of Pictures.

A woman bought three pictures in a Fifth avenue art store. "Shall I send some one up to hang them?" asked the dealer. 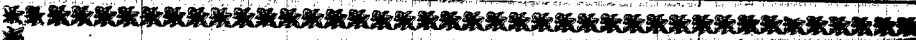

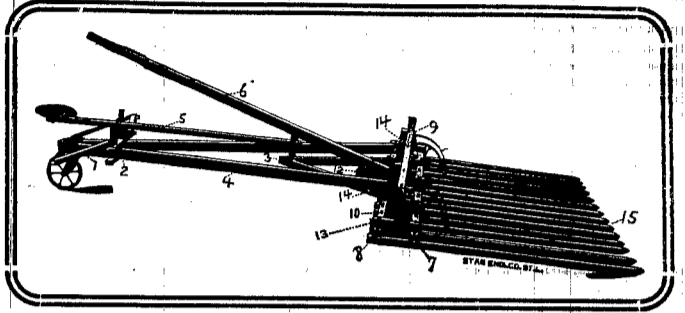
