The Chaon Divorce Case.

On September 7, 1905, at Sioux City, Viola M. Friel of that city and A. F. Chaon of Randolph were married. The parties became acquainted through an advertisement placed in the daily papers by the groom and answered by the bride and some 30 others. After one year and eleven months of domestic unhappiness for both parties Mrs. Chaon has begun suit for divorce, and has filed her petition in the district court at Omaha. She left Randolph and her husband in July. Ex-Judge C. F. Dickinson of Omaha is the lawyer for the plaintiff and the petition he sets up is a terror. The case will be rich, rare and racy.

Mrs. Chaon alleges that she has been cruelly and inhumanly treated and abused, that less than two weeks after her marriage she was compelled to seek a physician who pronounced her trouble to be the results of her husband's abuse. She also alleges that Chaon called her bad names and did not heed her the family residence and grounds just over the line in Pierce county as he promised to do at the time of their marriage this agreement being part of the marriage contract.

On the other hand the doughty groom of 65 summers, claims that he has also suffered, that his whiskers have been pulled and that she is seeking to get his money and for this reason married him. He also denies many of her allegations. He did execute a deed to her for the property named, reserving a life interest in the same, and giving it to her in fee simple at his death. He says she wanted it before he died and will try to get it in the divorce court. He also sets up other reasons why she should not be given a divorce and heavy alimony. He will fight the case to a finish if he is given an unreasonable verdict at Omaha.

Senator Wiltse is Mr. Caron's attorney, and it looks like the case will rival any that has been up for airing recently in the state. We have stated a part of the claims of each side, and it is enough to show that the clerk of the court at Omaha will have some realistic reading. The affairs of the couple are somewhat known about town and we make no further comment. —Randolph Times.

Economical Rations in Beef Productions.

Bulletin No. 100, entitled "Economical Rations in Beef Production," just issued by the Department of Animal Husbandry of the Nebraska Experimental data, together with comments upon each of the problems investigated. The results cover a period of four years and are briefly summarized at the close of the close of the report as follows:

Prairie hay when fed with corn alone to fattening cattle gives small and unsatisfactory gains and very little or no profit.

Alfalfa hay with corn alone gives large and profitable gains.

The use of well-cured corn-stover with alfalfa and corn, while it may not produce larger gains, will make the gains less costly because of its low market value, thereby increasing the profits over corn and alfalfa alone.

In feeding only prairie hay as roughness to fattening cattle, much larger and more profitable gains can be made if linseed meal or possibly some other protein concentrate is fed with corn in small quantity rather than feeding corn alone.

The results of two experiments indicate that linseed-meal is a little more valuable than cottonseed-meal and much more valuable than wheat bran for supplementing corn when fed with prairie hay or corn-stover.

When alfalfa is made at least half of the roughness with prairie hay or corn-stover, good gains may be made and at less cost than when no alfalfa is fed, the protein being supplied by the use of linseed-meal. In other words, it is possible to grow protein on the farm at a price much below what it will cost on the market in the form of some commercial protein food.

Corn-stover cut immediately after the ears ripen and cured in shocks possesses a value two-thirds as great as prairie hay. The part usually consumed, viz., the leaves and upper portion of the stalk, is quite the equal of prairie hay pound for pound.

The results of a single experiment in which but little more than half a full feed of corn was supplied two lots of fattening steers suggest the possibility of making a larger use of hay in finishing cattle for market than is ordinarily made and at less cost, especially where hay is relatively low and corn high in price.

From a commercial point of view the results of this entire series of experiments go to show that cattle feeding can be made profitable when discretion is used in the selection of foods for the ration. On the average farm in Nebraska where grain and hay command figures below Lincoln prices and where cattle are undisturbed by frequent weighings which experimental feeding necessitates, the profits can be made much greater than those reported in this bulletin. Good feeding will make our corn bring more as beef than when sold direct to the elevator companies even tho the selling price of finished cattle is not far in advance of cost price in many of these experiments. The importance of manure and the growing of alfalfa and clover as agencies contributing to the maintenance and increase of land fertility argue further for the mode of selling a larger part of our annual corn crop. The cattle industry deserves much greater attention in this state than has been given it in the past.

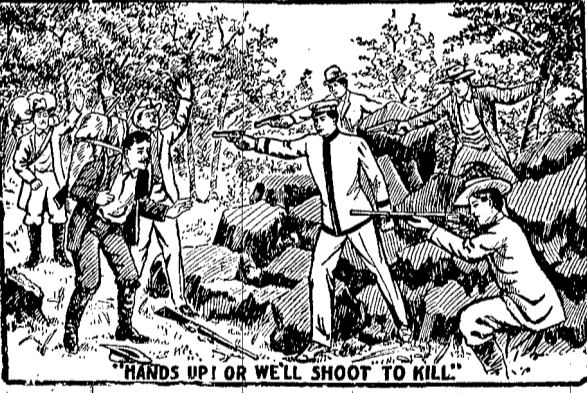

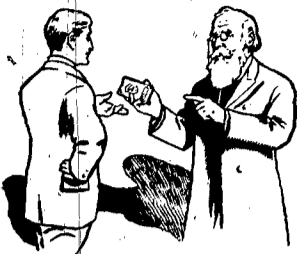

Subscription Price to Raise.

I want a pair of vici kid, size 11 EE., tip toe, and I think I want them on the same last and same toe as the "Deft" boots you got me last spring of the Florsheim Co. Have them hurry them up and express them direct to me at this place and I will settle with you for them when I get home in November. I want them canvass lined, with good heavy sole and let it project in fair shape. Oh, you know what I want, so send in the order and get 'em. We have 270 acres of oats cut and shocked and about 70 acres yet to cut and good judges say our crop will make an average of 40 bushels per acre so you can readily figure up that we have a fair sized crop to take care of. We have just finished a granary that if filled as full as it will hold can take care of about 20,000 bushels, but we will not fill it this season. Our entire crop this year is oats and from the looks of things—as to prices—we have made a fair guess as to the most profitable crop. Remember this crop has had no water except rain and for a desert country and breaking it seems as though this country isn't much of a failure. Mrs. C. is feeling very well and certainly the summer in Idaho has been a good one for her as you will agree when you see her within the next month. We expect to thresh in about two weeks. Charley R. missed it in not coming here last spring. I suppose Frank Owen has gotten home ere this and has told you his opinion of the country and its prospects as he views it. The nights are getting pretty cool and the days are about as delightful as you can imagine and I often feel sorry for you folks when I think how you must be suffering and sweltering with heat, but I hope it has or is making you one of the best corn crops you ever grew. I expected Will Gildersleeve would come here on his trip but I guess he either lacked time or inclination or rather both. We expect to fall plow anywhere from 200 to 350 acres before winter sets in and as soon as threshing is done will start two gang plows to work and will turn over from 7 to 10 acres per day. 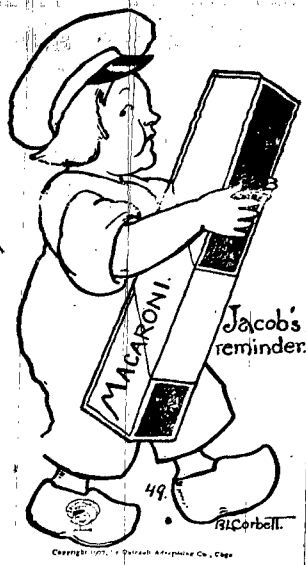

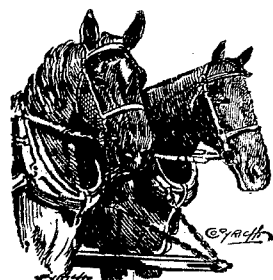
