A. F. Chaon Replies. Randolph Times: Through his at-torney A. F. Charon has filed an answer in the district court at Omaha to his wife's petition for divorce and alimony. The only thing that Chaon admits was that they were married at Sioux City and resided in Ran-dolph—all else he declares is not He denies treating her in a true. cruel and inhuman way and his petition sets fourth some startling alle-

gations. Chaon says that he was a dutiful husband, but that his wife began from the first to make things lively for him and to systematically appropriate to her own use any money that she could get her hands on. He says that before they were married he settled a dentist's and boctor's bill for her in Sioux City. That she sold the milk, cream and butter from several cows and kept the money while he furnished cow feed and did the milking. She also sold all the vegetables, eggs, chickens, and also two cows and he didn't see a cent of the money. She sold chickens for eash and had chicken feed charged to him. She also kept one boarder and collected the board money, as well as some of his wages, while he furnished her clothing and eatables from his own means. He figures she has had \$1105 of his money in eleven months.

To make things more interesting the husband files a cross petition and asks divorce from his wife without alimony. As to the testimony it will be her word against his, and his word against hers, for the most part. It is probable that the case will be heard in 23 days.
