Valley P. Nethaway Commits Murder and Suicide

SHOT WIFE IN CROWDED CAR

Murderer Then Goes To Nearby Elevator and Blows His **Brains Out**

A crowded passenger car on the Union Pacific at Norfolk was the of a terrible trrgedy Thursday afternoon in which Valley P. Nethaway a local hide buyer shot nis wife and then killed himself. Mrs. Nethaway died a few hours The wife had brought divorce proceedings against her husband and was on her way to Madison where the trial was to have been held that night.

Nethaway was quite well known in Northern Nebraska as a crack shot and had won prizes in several shooting tournaments. He was slightly known here in Wayne where he has been several times on business. The press correspondents give the following particulars of the shooting

In full view of a panic stricken coach load of passengers on an outgoing train here this afternoon Valley P. Nethaway blew out the brains of his wife and then leaping off the train, sent a bullet into his own brain in a nearby grain elevator. he used a revolver for his own slay-

Passengers dodged under seats for safety and some escaped through the windows. One man's coat, hanging over a seat was riddled by Nethaway's shot, and the hat of Mrs. Fred Harder, a friend who sat with Mrs. Nethaway, was also struck

Nethaway, before committing suicide, said the one thing he regretted was that he had not killed former United States Senator William V. Allen of Madison, attorney for Mrs. stead and all should be; as whatever ending his own life, Nethaway tele-

"Prepare yourself to die," he told his wife. Then he warned the pas

sengers to get out of the way. With his words the car was the scene of a mad scramble for safety. Most of the passengers dropped down under the seats, but some in the flurry of the moment found exit through the car windows. Standing in the door Nethaway emptied both barrels. He shot true, for his fame as a shot has been known over north Nebraska for many years.

The left side of Mrs. Nethaway skull was literally torn away. The greater part of one charge, probably the second shot, was received by the rim of the seat in front.





Small-Pox at Wakefield

There has been all kinds of stories old of the small-pox situation at Wakefeld but it seems there are but four mild cases. A correspondent from there to the Sioux City Journal says: Wakefield, in spite of all the reports to the contrary, has but four mild cases of small-pox in the village. Two of these are confined in private homes, another at a boarding house and Mr. Boyd, landlord of the Commercial house is confined in the hotel on the west side of the street. This house has been used only for rooming purposes. The first case will be let out tomorrow, his time having expired which will leave but three cases. So far only two places in the country are affected, one at Art Slaughter's, nine miles south in Wayne county, and Lemmy | Hooger, four miles north-

The churches here were planning on their usual Christmas festivities and the merchants had already every thing in stock for Christmas trade. The local board of health, considering the nearness of the holidays and the safety of the public at large and to not intimidate patrons coming to Wakefield, met in a joint session with the school board Saturday afternoon and ordered all churches closed and public gatherings of all kinds stopped and the village school closed, the schools to remain closed until the first week in January, in this way losing but one week of school, as the usual two weeks vacation had been previously arranged for. Should there be no new case from exposure within the next fourteen days the churches and public gatherings will be allowed to go on. It is the aim and object of the board of health and the citizens of Wake field to check this disease as speedily
