and this is the second time our little city has had the honor and privilege of entertaining the State Synod. | A large number, about 100, representatives of this great and growing denomination enjoyed the hospitality of many of the pleasant homes in Wayne from last Thursday evening until Wednesday morning this week, and also discussed plans and themes of work for a still farther advance along all moral lines and the welfare of their church The Synod was opened on Thurs

day evening by an excellent sermon by the retiring Moderator, Rev. Samuel Light, which commanded the respectful and attentive hearing of the audience which filled the church. After the devotional services Fri-ay morning came the transaction of business, first of which was the selection of a new Moderator, and the choice fell upon Rev. James G Glarke, of Mitchell, Nebraska. Dr. John Baird, who, for thirty-four years had served as Stated Clerk, retired, and Rev. Thos. L. Sexton, D. D., for twenty-two years synodical missionary, was elected to the position. Reports were received re-

garding the condition of Hastings in a different way and Bellevue colleges and the Oma ha seminary, all of which indicated that these institutions were in a dourishing condition. In the afternoon, among other items of business the Synod approved of the plan to build in Onvaha a Protestant Christian I niversity, a site for which has already been secured. There was also an address by D. E. Jenkins, D. D., Prof. in Omaha seminary, on the Religious Problem." In the evening there was a popular meeting, very largely attended, and addressed by Revs. Stephen W. Stockey and James Stuart Dickson on education-

Saturday was devoted to Sabbath school and Christian Endeaver work. The forenoon was taken up with re-ports from various fields regarding the condition and outlook, all of which were of an encouraging na-ture. Much interest was shown in these themes, and the addresses in the afternoop were calculated to inspire zeal in a good cause. The lead address in the evening Alexander Henry D. D., o Rev. Alexander Henry D. D. (of Philadelphia, which was a masterly and inspiring effort. There were other short addresses full of good things for the large assemblage of listeners. Sunday was a very busy day and full of good things too. At the regdar hour of morning worship there was a sernion by the Moderator which was characterized with high deals, and rich thoughts, followed by the administration of the Lord's supper which was partaken of by a large number. At two o'clock in the afternoon there was a song service and sermon on the street, at three o'clock a union temperance rally at

the Presbyterian church addressed by Rev. Clarence Weyer of Hastings and in the evening an evangelistic service, with a sermon by Rev. C. T. Schaeffer of Winona Lake.
