Effective January 1 next new guarantee labels must be changed so us to show plainly that the guarantee is that of the manufacturers and not of the government, because of the large sums invested in good faith in labels and plates. The old form of labels now in use representing surantees afrieady filed with the department will be recognized for a term of two years.






