

NEEDS DOING RIGHT

Alfred Bohlander Is a Man Wh Will Carefully Look After All the Details of the County Clerk's Office.

One of the jobs that is occupying the attention of the county clerk's office now is the making of the tax list for the year. It takes practically a year to do this job and it gets bigger every year. One does not realize until he has seen it how big a job it is nor how important it is that it is accurately done. First the assessors make up their schedules. Then the county clerk's office has to check up the job to see that it is right, see that no mistakes have been made and get the total for each school district and each precinct and for the county in general. Then the board of equalization finds that horses have been assessed a litthat horses have been assessed a lit-tle too low in one precinct and cattle a little too high in another. It is jup to the clerk to figure up every change, reduce the valuation of evchange, reduce the valuation of every calf in the precinct ten per cent and raise every colt five per cent. Then an individual comes along and shows that he did not own that steer at all. That has to be taken out. Then the new total has to be figured again. Pretty soon the various officials state how much money they want to run the school, the road, the insane hospital, poor relief and so on. The clerk has to find out just what amount of property is properly assessable in every school district and in every precinct and figure up what rate of tax will raise the amount called for. Probably about that time some one decides to about that time some one decides to patronize the school in the other dis-trict. Then his property has to be subtracted from the total in the one and added to that in the other district and both have to be done ove and added to that in the other district and both have to be done over again. Probably—whokehown to the assessor John Smith, away up in the northeast corner of the county, sells one acre off of his farm, to be used for a cemetery. Here is another change; Maybe he sells it to Peter Jones. The derk has to know it and make the change in the taxes. If on page 479 of book 18 of deeds it appears that this transfer has been made wouldn't John Smith put up a roar if he was taxed on that acre; so all these things have to be remembered. 

Guaranty Law Void

Judge T. C. Munger for the United States circuit court yesterday delivered an opinion holding the bank guaranty law bassed by the last leginvere an opinion nothing the bank regularity law bassed by the last legislature void. 



One of the prominent offidials of the treasury department recently ventured the opinion that not one banker in a hundred and probably not half a dozen members of the senate or house could tell accurately what parts of the United States currency are legal tender. He went on to say:

"A great many people know that the definition of legal tender is money of a character which by law a debtor may require his creditor to receive in payment in the absence of a special agreement. But when it comes to stating just what money is legal tonder you will find the banker all at saa. "Gold certificates are not a legal tender, but are receivable for customs, taxes and all public-debts. Siliver certificates are not legal tender. Netther are national bank notes. They are receivable, however, in payment of taxes, excess, public lands and all other dues to the United States, except duties on imports. Trade dollars and fractional currency are not legal tender. Practional currency is terreceivable for postage and revenue stamps and also in payment of any dues to the United States, except duties on imports. Trade dollars and fractional currency are not legal tender. "The following are legal tender in all that the term means;"
