Must Pay

A divorced man who marries, for the second time rannot evade the payment of alimony for which judgment was entered at the time he was divorced by pleading his exemption as the head of a family. This was decided for the first time in this state by District Judge Cornish in the case of Flora May B. Bassler vs. Robert L. Bassler, at Lincoln. These parties were divorced in 1908 and judgment entered against the defendant requiring him to pay \$40 per month for the support of the children. He was again married last August and being in arrears for alimony, garnishment proceedings were instituted for the purpose of collecting \$100 which was in the hands of his employers. He set up the defense that being the head of a family, his salary was exempt. Judge Cornish decided that the children by the first marriage are as much a part of his family as is his present wife and his obligation to support them just as great. 


