Fingree C. Hughes has been placed in charge of the commercial department of the telephone system in Wayne under the new management. W. K. It has not yet been definitely arranged as to who is to be the chief operator.

Wayne has been very fortunate in the matter of fires. If any have got started they have been seen in time to be smothered before gaining much headway. The alarm Saturday afternoon was no exception to the rule. As Mrs. Miller, living near the city pumping station stepped out her back door she noticed a small blaze on the north side of a John Lewis barn, south of the oil tanks. She at once gave the alarm and a couple of men working nearby grabbed a pail of water and ran to the scene, arriving there in time to prevent the flames going upward very fast. Others were soon on the scene and the fire was out before the department got on the scene. It was very fortunate, as not only was the barn mow full of hay but there were several stacks of it a short distance to the north, and had the fire gained any headway, with the strong south wind blowing it is hard to tell where the end might have been, as the flying embers would have been carried long distances and in almost every direction. Just how the fire originated remains a mystery.

Hoskins State Bank Reorganized. The Hoskins State Bank has been reorganized with the following officers: President, August Ziemer; vice president, Ed. Behner; cashier, R. G. Rohrk; assistant cashier, R. E. Templin; board of directors, August Ziemer, Ed. Behner, William Zutz, C. E. Burnham, and R. G. Rohrk. The bank has a capital of \$10,000, and a surplus and profits of \$5,500. It was organized in 1900 and a steady growth was enjoyed under the management and methods of John F. Crosby, who was the bank's cashier for ten years. He goes to Denyer, Colorado, where he will engage in the real estate business.

Bank Robbed. Considerable excitement was produced here Monday morning by the report that the vault of the First National Bank at Randolph had been dynamited and robbed early that morning. Later reports indicate that the thieves, three in number, got away with \$11,500. The work shows it to have been the work experts. They found the town night watch on the street, held him up at the point of their revolvers, bandaged his eyes, tied his hands behind him, took him to the bank, locked him in a closet and then proceeded to their work. It was about an hour after they were gone before the night watch could get out and give the alarm. \$3,000 has been offered as a reward for the capture of the robbers, but aside from the fact that they evidently went to Norfolk no trace of them has been found. It looks as though there might be a snag in that vicinity as the bank at Hadar, the postoffice at Bloomfield, and the bank at Randolph have all been robbed within a few months.
