Several witnesses were placed on the stand. The last one to be called was the defendant. He answered in a gentlemanly way the questions put to him by his attorney and also by the attorney for the state until in the midst of a rigid cross examination the county attorney with flashing eye thundered in a loud voice, "Answer my question, sir!" This was more than the defendant could bear and jumping up from his seat he grabbed his chair and in a voice full of emotion said: "I won't be insulted. I'm a gentleman and I want to be treated like a gentleman. You treat me like a gentleman or you'll go out thru that window." The court here interfered and ordered Constable S. L. Thompson to take the witness out of doors for five minutes. The lawyers then got to jangling between themselves and the court had to order them to sit down and be quiet. The witness soon returned and the trial proceeded without further trouble, but for a time it was quite exciting. After the attorneys had made their pleas Judge Marriot announced the decision of the court as follows: That the defendant, Frank Livenspire, pay the costs of the case \$14.20 and be fined the sum of \$50, payment of fine not being required during the good behavior of the defendant.

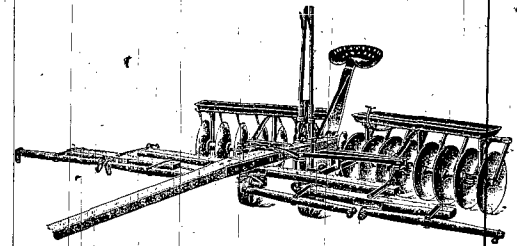
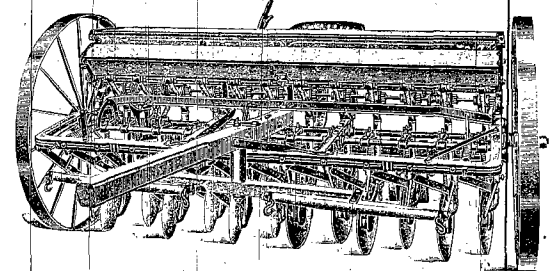

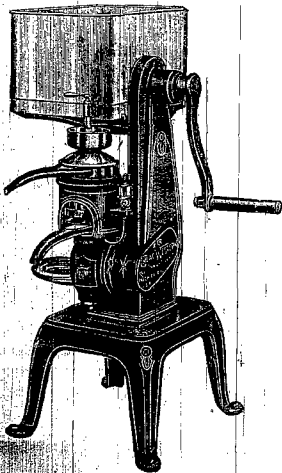

Stanton will vote April 4 on a proposition to issue \$10,000 worth of bonds for the purpose of building a sewer system.

Randolph Times: Last week the Times said Easter was April 6. This date is 40 days from Ash Wednesday which fell on March 1st, but is not Easter. Easter comes on Sunday, April 16. 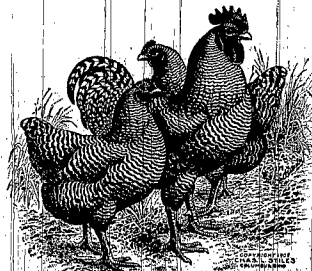

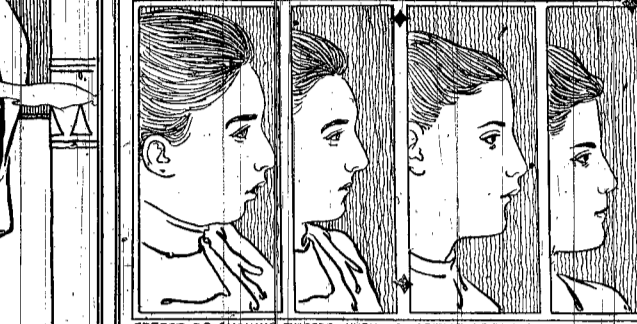

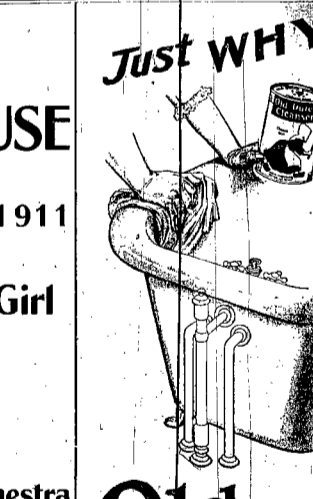
