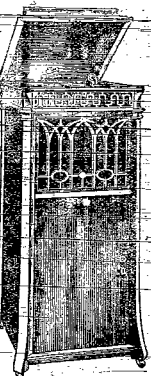

SERGEANT SMITH WRITES.

Mr. and Mrs. C. K. Smith, living west of Wayne have received the following letter from their son, Sergeant Geo. Lee Smith, with Company 1, 355th Infantry, St. Francis, Mo. Nov. 27, 1918. "Well, here we are about one mile from Belgium, engaged in the fighting... We sailed June 4 and landed in Liverpool June 16. We took the train to London, where we stayed about a week and then sailed from Southampton to Harco where we stayed one day. Then we took the train for Antwerp and there where we underwent six weeks' intensive training. We went to the front August 7, and since then I was in the line but not in any fighting until November 11, at 11 A. M. "We took part in the St. Mihiel drive starting at Elroy, September 22. It was a hard day, a never to be forgotten morning. I will tell you about it some day, but it would take too long to write it. "We stayed on the new lines about a month and then came over here and stayed in support until November 1, when we advanced and took the strip of land between Belmont to Pouilly and Stenay. Company J took Pouilly and stayed there for a day. We got into the town and cornered the prisoners about 9 o'clock of the evening, so you see we were in it right up to the last hour. Then we moved back to Tilloy and there got baths and new clothes. We are now on our way to somewhere in Germany. "We have had some hard times and seen some terrible things, but we have also seen some great sights and it has been an education in itself. Now that is over and you are gotten through all right, I would not take a good deal for my experience. Night before last I stayed in an old farm house that was deserted. At one time the people must have kept 400 or 500 cows. In the room where we were we had a big fireplace, paper on the wall and a big hay rack to sleep on. Now we are in the old castle and it is treated to the same kind of things. These old medieval structures. This country surely must have looked good in normal times. "I am going to French seventy-five of a three-inch shell case home the other day with several little things in it. That I thought I would like to have. I have another one I will send as soon as I get to the post office. "Tomorrow is Thanksgiving day and I am northeast of Elroy, France, about one mile from Belgium. I would give a good thing for it to see you over here, inside the hard coal burner. I sent a telegram to you a day that was going behind the lines, that I was O. K. and then Jim Sawyer and I sent another to the same effect so you may know that I am O. K. With love to all the folks. "Sergeant George L. Smith, Company 1, 355th Infantry."

NEBRASKA STATE BANKS.

Lincoln, Neb., Dec. 27.—An increase of \$74,000,000 in the deposits of Nebraska banks during the past two years is reported by Secretary J. T. Touhy of the state banking board. The annual summary of banking conditions transmitted to that body.

His report in part follows: "There were 104 banks operating under state authority at the close of business on November 1, 1918. During the biennium 10 new banks were organized and 10 banks voluntarily liquidated while twelve consolidations were effected, thus producing a net gain in number of ninety-five. The aggregate capital and surplus combined shows an increase of \$5,303,288.66.

"Within the same period the total of deposits has advanced from \$165,527,529.69 to \$239,815,326.66, a net increase of \$74,287,796.97. The bulk of loans shows an increase of \$69,259,939.46. The guaranty fund now aggregates \$1,885,697.92, the increase for the two years being \$689,773.

Only Part of Wealth. These figures, while representing with reasonable accuracy the wonderful growth of the banking business during this period, do not by any means show the true accumulations of wealth in the state. In this connection the fact must not be overlooked that the interests of these banks has been largely invested heavily in Liberty bonds and contributed to other war funds, an amount at least equal to the increase shown in total deposits. Then too only about one-half of the business of the state is done through state banks. Including these essential factors, an approximate estimate of the wealth accumulations of the people of the state may be predicted.

Should Make Allowance. "In the analysis of the individual reports due allowance should be made for the call loans which are reported upon the fourth bond drive, and also the low reserves and excessive overdrafts are directly attributable to the same. In the light of the report, however, the department has been advised of a report that the state banks are in a position to make a contribution to the fourth Liberty loan. This service, coupled with many other contributions to the war, has demonstrated ability and energy to the limit. It is worthy of note that these gigantic tasks have been accomplished in the light of a privilege as well as a duty.
