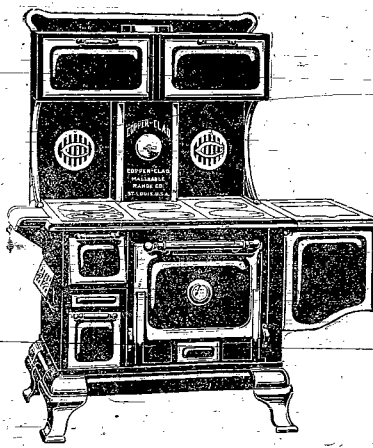

Clause Johan Nelson died at his home in Concord, Neb., Thursday, March 22, 1923, aged 75 years, 6 months and 11 days. He was a native of Sweden, being born Sept. 11, 1847, in Stockholm, Jönköping, Smoland, though his name, Christian instruction and confirmation he became a member of the Lutheran church over there. In 1868 he came to North Star, locating first in Mercer county, Ill. He also lived

in Henry county, Ill., and at Leavenworth, Michigan, returning to Wakefield when he started farming in 1875. He married Christina Burnson of Andover, Ill., and moved to Essex, Ia. In 1884 the family came to North Star and resided there until where Mr. Nelson purchased land. For many years they lived on their farm a mile northeast of Dixon. Mr. Nelson was one of the pioneers who proved himself to be an industrious, progressive farmer, building up a good home for his family. He was held in high esteem by those who knew him. He was a loving husband and father, having great respect for his family. He was a faithful member of the Lutheran church and a charter member of the Lutheran Concordia church in Concord, always taking active part in the welfare of its mission. In the year 1917, Mr. Nelson retired from farming and moved to Concord. About two years ago he was overtaken with illness which gradually increased until God brought deliverance. The last words heard from his wife, "Jesus, my Saviour, come soon."

Two children predeceased Mr. Nelson in death: Emma Christina in 1880 and Johanna Carolina, wife of Edward Fredrickson. He leaves to mourn his departure, his wife, who by sickness, was deprived of following the remains to their last resting place; six children, Ida, Josephine, Theodora, Annetta Sophia, Lehman Anna Elenora, Carl August Arthur, John LeRoy and Emma Ottilie Tuttle; four sons-in-law, Edward Fredrickson, Hans Thomsen, Herman and Clyde Erwin Tuttle; two daughters-in-law, Mrs. C. A. Arthur Nelson and Mrs. LeRoy Nelson; thirteen grandchildren and two great-grandchildren, all living in the Concord vicinity; two brothers, P. August Nelson and Carl J. Nelson of Concord; one sister, Mrs. August Johnson of Essex, Ia., and many other relatives and friends.

The bereaved family has the heartiest sympathy of many friends and of the Concordia Lutheran congregation.

Interment was in Concord cemetery after funeral services held Sunday at 2 p. m., from the home and at 2:30 from the church. Rev. P. Pearson conducted the service. Music was furnished by Miss May Pearson, Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Johnson, Ivar Anderson and Miss Olga Swanson. Flowers were sent by six grandchildren. Pall bearers were P. A. Forsberg, G. O. 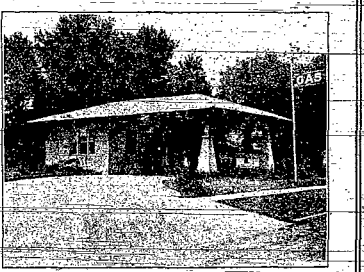

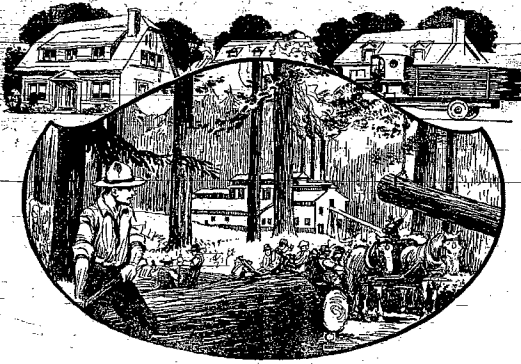

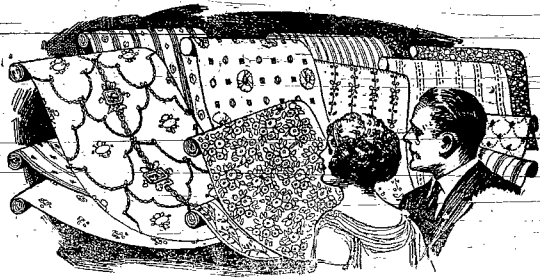

Sinking of the Iowa. Sioux City Journal: The famous battleship Iowa is gone. The once proud fighter, which had a glorious record, is no more. It was sunk to its grave in the deep by the powerful guns of a modern superdreadnaught, which battered the old hulk with heavy shells and at last, with more powerful projectiles, administered the coup de grace. That the Iowa withstood for two days the best attempts possible with the thin walled shells from the Mississippi's guns shows the vessel was sturdy and strong even against modern weapons.

The Iowa participated in the destruction of Cervera's fleet in the Spanish-American war. It won fame at Santiago, and for years, there were no fighting ships afloat that were any better. Progress, however, had its way. Better ships were built as the need for them developed, and finally, the Iowa, like a great many other craft that had won honor and glory, became obsolete, outclassed by the newer vessels. To the sinking of the Iowa a feature of the incident that is surcharged with sentiment cannot be overlooked, especially so since there is a division because of viewpoints entirely controlled by different environments. The landman cannot quite see why a ship that had been a good one should be bombarded and sent down, but it is impossible to pension a vessel. The navy man sees it in a different light. He insists that the warship finds its greater glory at the end of its service in a grave in the very element which it knew, the sea. Any use made of it to protect the intrinsic value of the materials of which it was constructed is abhorrent to the men in the service.

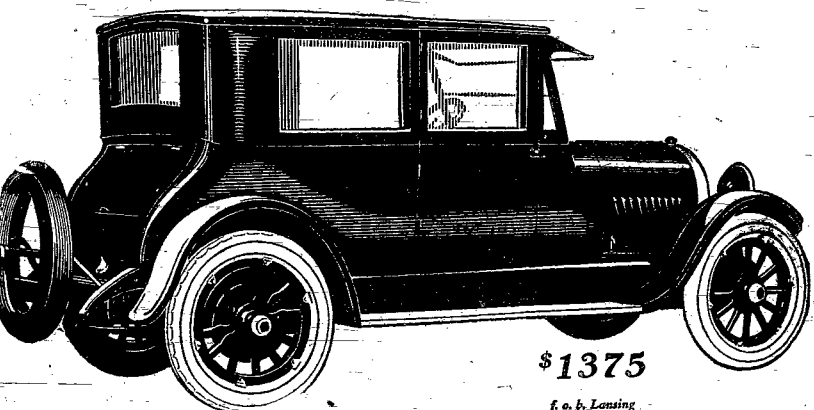
