



"Many women who this time last year were planning to stop taking at the first hint of autumn coolness, have learned that this is a mistal The realleconomy of the year round use of ice now is widely recognize It costs the average American family no more than thirty dollars enjoy the benefits of ice every day in the year," says Dr. Martha Maning, home refrigeration expert.

"True economy, and consideration of health and enjoyable food as well demands year-round-home refrigeration," Dr. Manning asserts. "This partly has come about through a change in the national diet. Extensive research shows that in the average household spoilage is far more costly than refrigeration. To refrigeration is added the important advantages of wholesomeness and attrictiveness in food.

Tood is especially subject to fuick deterioration during the autumn season because of highly variable temperatures. Days of summer warmth unexpectedly alternate with those of winter chill, a condition harmful to food in itself. Bacterial life, which is the actual cause of all food decay, is at its height in autumn, and hastens spoilage in all foods containing moisture."
