Writer Of Checks Paroled In Norfolk

Norfolk News, Nov. 17: Agreeing to "make good" on a number of worthless checks he confessed to writing, William Dennis, 23, living near Pilger, was paroled to Constable Harry Meister, Norfolk, for sixty days by Justice of Peace E. C. Warner, Warnerville, Tuesday afternoon. Dennis, according to the authorities, said he was going to resume his corn husking to secure funds to pay those who hold the "bad" checks, which amount to a total of \$85.50. He has a wife and small child. Justice of Peace Warner said he was willing to give Dennis a chance to make good his promises to pay the sums he owes merchants in Winside, Norfolk and Plainview. The young farmer was arrested Monday evening at the August Wegner home, ten miles south of Wisner, the arrest being the end of a search started on October 31. Search is being made for Henry Mousel, Dennis' companion, who is charged with writing "bad" checks. He is believed to be in Omaha, going to that place the first of this week from Norfolk in which place he was seen last Thursday night.
