

Conference on Cause and Cure of War Makes This Conclusion at Washington.

Leaders Present

Great Thinkers Consider Definitions of War and Propose Ways to Peace.

Good will and friendly understanding are at the bottom of world peace, stated Mrs. Addison E. Sheldon of Lincoln, Nebraska representative to the Cause and Cure of War conference held in January in Washington, D. C., in speaking at the State Normal in Wayne Friday evening at a public program sponsored by the Wayne branch of the American Association of University Women.

The Cause and Cure of War conference, held in Washington from January 17 to 19, was the third such annual conference of the country's leaders who are interested in working out means to end war. Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, woman of ability, presided. She is the promoter of the movement and is devoting all of her energy and fortune to promotion of peace.

Is Third Conference. The Cause and Cure of War conference, held in Washington from January 17 to 19, was the third such annual conference of the country's leaders who are interested in working out means to end war.

War is Defined. The experts first discussed the definition of war. It was agreed that war and national defense are the same.

Means Toward Peace. In discussing treaties, it was pointed out from history that these are often broken though they are more often kept.
