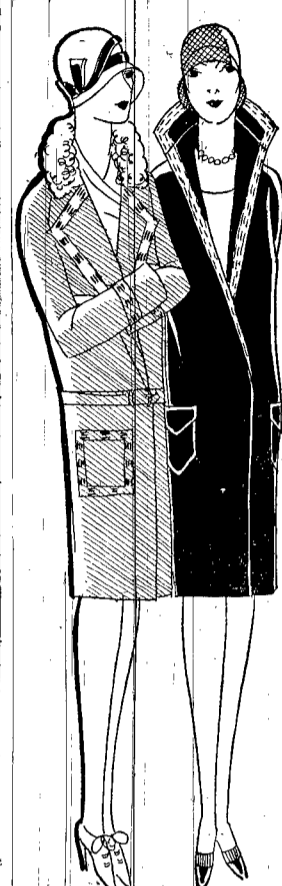

Officers Elected By School Board

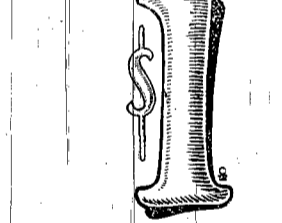
