Winside and one near Hoskins, each cutting off two railroad crossings. It is understood that this will eventually be graded.

Other Road Improvements Less than one mile of graveling remains to be done on the highway between West Point and Oakland. An extra one inch of gravel is being placed on a seven-mile stretch of the Meridian highway south of the Pierce county line. Previously a one-inch coating was placed on this stretch. The Meridian highway from Norfolk north is all gravelled to a point nine miles north of Wausa, with the exception of about one mile. No decision has been made regarding the washout about two miles south of the Yankton bridge on the Meridian, where a small wooden bridge was recently ripped from its foundation by a swollen creek. However, the state department expects to announce its plans within the next few days. In all probability the new 300-foot bridge over the Elkhorn river north of Oakland will be ready for traffic in about sixty days. Construction operations are practically finished, except grading, clay surfacing and graveling on this approach. The crew graveling highway No. 20 on a sixteen-mile job between Osmond and Plainview is making rapid progress.

Second General Test Finished In County

The percentage of infection among cattle in Wayne county herds following the second general tuberculosis eradication testing under Dr. D. M. Purdy, is .79. Five of the precincts ran over one percent and these will be retested. The average will thus be lowered and the county will soon be ready for accreditation. Chapin, one of the precincts, has been tested for the third time and the infection was found to have been reduced from 1.19 to .0011. The other four having percentages of more than one, Brenna, Deer Creek, Garfield, Hancock and Logan, will soon have these reduced in the third test. Report of the second general test showing the number of cattle tested in each precinct and the percentage of infection is as follows: Brenna, 1,578 cattle, 1.14 percent; Chapin, 1,763 cattle, 1.19 percent; Deer Creek, 1,764 cattle, 1.58 percent; Garfield, 1,521 cattle, 1.05 percent; Hancock, 1,828 cattle, .38 percent; Hipskins, 1,823 cattle, .49 percent; Hunter, 1,953 cattle, .56 percent; Leslie, 988 cattle, .40 percent; Logan, 945 cattle, 1.48 percent; Plum Creek, 1,694 cattle, .23 percent; Sherman, 746 cattle, .80 percent; Strickland, 1,458 cattle, .75 percent; Wilbur, 1,338 cattle, .44 percent. On the total of 20,397 cattle the percent was .79.
