McCormick-Deering Corn Planters



Imagine counting kernels from your right hand to your left hand—one, two, three and drop them—one, two, three and drop them. You could do that repeatedly until it became strictly mechanical, and drop three kernels every time with unerring accuracy, yet you can do it scarcely more accurately than the mechanism under the McCormick-Deering 100 Series planter or drill hopper will do it. By cunning devices the seed is herded, one kernel to a cell (in edge or flat-drop plates, two, three or four to a cell in full hill-drop plates) carried to the discharge opening and released to the seed channel in the boot, where the unique and smoothly working valve arrangement holds it until the proper time to release it to the soil.

A Sure-Shot Variable Drop

Earlier inventors probably thought they had attained the ultimate when they had devised a machine that would put two, three or four kernels in the ground in checked rows with a fair degree of accuracy. But to be able to regulate, instantly, the amount of seed which would be accurately counted out to the discharge channel was unthought of. Today, the particular grower demands this feature and it has been worked out in the McCormick-Deering planter in a simple, practical manner, which gives the user his choice of two, three of four kernels in checked hills, or one of three variations of drilling distance, with the same seed plate. A mere shifting of the foot lever (without stopping the planter) does the trick.

Built-in Power Hill-Drop

On most planters it is necessary to order special equipment when it is desired to bunch-drop drill. On the McCormick-Deering check-row planter a very simple change in one of the clutch members converts the planter into a power hill-drop drill for bunch dropping. This additional feature gives the McCormick-Deering planter, as regularly equipped, a wider range of adjustments than is to be found on any other planter.
