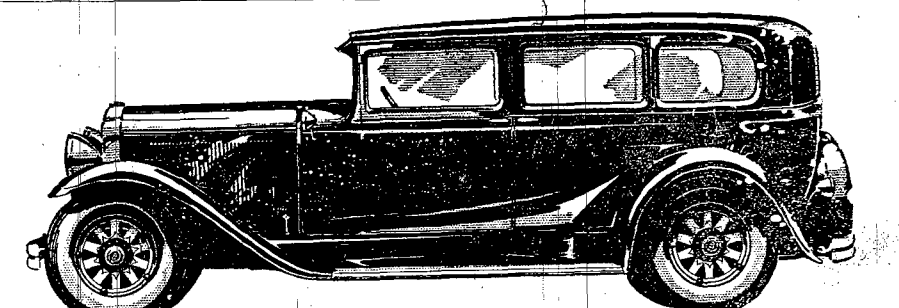

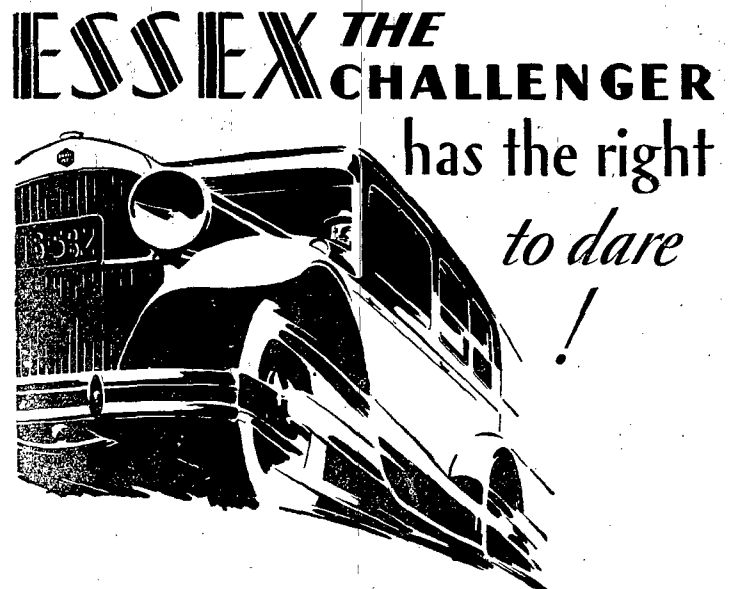

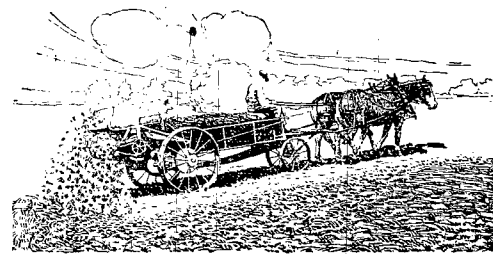

### Ventilator Helps Keep Crib Corn

(Nebraska Farmer.)  
Farmers who have corn cribs eight or nine feet wide can probably store and keep all the soft

corn they may have this year without danger of it spoiling, but those men who have wide cribs, from ten to twelve feet, may find it profitable to build an A-shaped ventilator lengthwise through each crib. Pressure is always greatest and circulation of air

cut off the most at the middle and near the bottom of the crib, and this is where most spoilage occurs in soft corn.  
The ventilator recommended by the Nebraska College of Agriculture has been used and found practical by many farmers of

eastern Nebraska and western Iowa. It is made of two by four material, seven or eight feet long joined together at the top with a mitre joint and spread to a width of three feet at the bottom. It is braced with one by six boards. The frame pieces of two

by four are spaced two feet apart and each pair of frame pieces is braced to prevent the pressure of the corn from crushing it together. The cribbing material may be one by four, spaced an inch and a half apart.  
The ventilators need not be

built the full length of the crib. They may stop four feet from the ends. They should be placed in position and toenailed down before any corn is put into the crib, then the first loads should be shoveled in from both sides to prevent the ventilators from be-

ing pushed out of position.

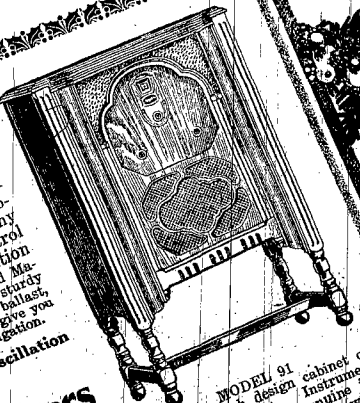

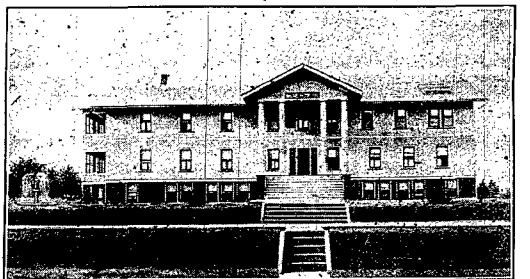

Know All Men By These Presents: That we, the undersigned, do hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming an association and corporation not organized for pecuniary profit, under the laws of the State of Nebraska and to that and do hereby adopt the following constitution:

1. The name of this company shall be Wayne College Dormitory Corporation.

2. The principal office of this corporation shall be at Wayne, Nebraska.

3. 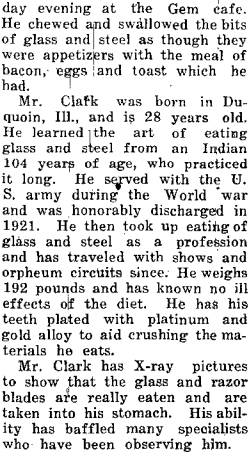

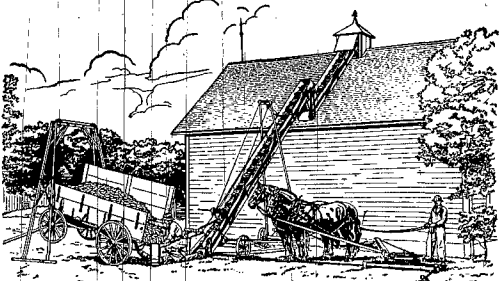
