THE county assessor reports that the railroad's assessed valuation in Wayne county is \$1.016,000 as compared with \$1.022,000 last year. The total assessed valuation in the county is \$39,910,000 in 1928. Shrinkage is mainly due to short crops and fever animals on feed. Next Tuesday the county board will meet to fix the annual levy, and it is understood it will be revised downward somewhat—made possible by decreased needs and the increased gasolling tax. On the contrary, it is believed the state levy will be higher on account of increased state appropriations. A meeting of county treasurers of Nebraska was held at the office of State Engineer Roy Cochran in Lincoln last Thursday for the purpose of securing uniformity of action in enforcement of the new automobile drivers' license law which becomes effective the first of September. Application blanks for licenses will be ready the middle of August. County Treasurer J. J. Steele and one of his assistants, Miss Leona Bahde, of Wayne, were among those attending the meeting.

Each driver of a car must have a license after the first of September. The license costs, 75c and the proceeds will be divided in three equal parts, 25c to go to the state fund, 25c to the county fund and 25c to the treasurer personally. The state portion will go into funds of the department of public works for expenses of putting the new law into effect. The other portions will be used as the counties and treasurers wish.

The new law requires that each driver have a license of his own If there are several drivers for one car, each must have his own certificate. One who owns a car and does not do any of his own driving would not need have a certificate. Each driver must be 16. years old and must answer questions which will prove to the treasurer his ability to handle a car. Persons who have been driving for the past six months will be given licenses by answering questions and giving their ages. Each must apply in person.
