

Sioux City Journal: It has been announced by the treasury department that internal revenue collections for the fiscal year ending June 30 almost reached the 38,000,000,000 mark set by officials some months ago. The exact figure was \$2,939,054,375-43, which was an increase over collections of the previous fiscal year of \$148,518,837.75, or approximately a 5 per cent gain.




