

Man Takes Life Here On Sunday

Despondent Over Ill Health, Melvin Norton Suicides at Chichester Farm.

Rites Wednesday

Services for Early Resident of Wayne Are Held at Beckenhauer Parlor.

Despondent because of ill health, Melvin Norton, 77, committed suicide Sunday, August 25, by shooting himself in the head with a 22 rifle. E. L. Chichester, and family, with whom Mr. Norton made his home, were away from their place five miles west and one-half mile south of Wayne from 11 a. m. until 6 p. m. Sunday. When they did not find Mr. Norton there, they began a search. Authorities were asked to assist Monday and the body was found that afternoon in a corn field about thirty feet from the road. A coroner's jury held an inquest Monday afternoon and decided Mr. Norton suicided, probably early Sunday afternoon.

TOUCH OF FROST VISIBLE ON LOW LAND IS REPORT

EDWARD Perry reports a very light frost on low ground early Tuesday morning. It was not long visible, and of course did no damage. It is recalled that the first frost last year appeared in the morning of August 23, but it was too light to hurt. Last year's initial frost was followed by a half-inch of rain which was refreshing, but came too late to have much influence on parched corn. Notwithstanding absence of rain for a few weeks, earlier moisture is preserving vitality of the corn, and hot days are pushing it on to triumphant maturity. People traveling over the state lately say the best growth of corn is found in this part of Nebraska. Rainfall would doubtless prove beneficial, but without it an unusually large yield of good corn is reasonably assured. Some parts of the state which have had insufficient moisture all summer, will suffer a considerable corn shortage.

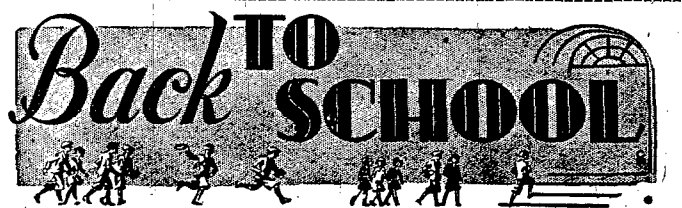

A writer contributing an article to a current magazine, calls attention to the number of men who have accepted appointments to official places in Washington at large sacrifice of financial incomes.

Men who can earn many times the salaries fixed by the government, have, on invitation of the president, gone into the public service to employ the same abilities that have made them successful in private walks of life.

Whether selecting men with records of private achievement in order to strengthen public service will help or hurt the president's popularity remains to be seen.

Anyway, it is evident that the president is determined to have the government business looked after by men who know how to do it well.

Business.

Sioux City Journal: It has been announced by the treasury department that interest revenue collections for the fiscal year ending June 30 marked a record of \$3,000,000,000 mark set by officials some months ago.

The exact figure was \$2,939,054,375.43, which was an increase over collections of the previous fiscal year of \$148,818,837.75, or approximately a 5 per cent gain.

The 5 per cent gain noted does not, however, apply to the increase in business operations. It does not represent the gain in earned income on which such taxes are paid, and for this reason: The tax rate was reduced in the previous fiscal year. It applied to the income tax payments referred to in the treasury announcement. The rate reduction was from 13 1/2 to 12 per cent on corporations. In addition the automobile excise tax was repealed and a substantial reduction was made in taxes on theater admissions.

Because of the heavy gain in income taxes in spite of the lowered rates the increase in business operations is bound to have been much larger. Earned income consequently would be much more than 5 per cent greater than in the fiscal year of 1928. Only an estimate is possible, but it is believed that the gain would show a 10 per cent advance over the previous year. There seems to be no doubt as to the prosperity of the country as indicated by these figures in addition to familiar data regarding the general economic situation.

Freight car loadings for the week ending August 10 again went over the 1,000,000 mark, reaching a total of 1,090,618. This is an excellent showing for a late summer period, and while it is a reduction of 13,577 cars under the preceding week it was an increase of 46,348 over the same week last year and one of 40,977 over the corresponding period of 1927.

Crop reports indicate that the yield generally will be reduced below the average. Wheat and other small grains will be short, with a smaller surplus on world markets as a result. Prices cannot fail to advance in consequence of the shortened crop. Meanwhile corn, now in a critical stage of development, has lost appreciably on account of lack of moisture in some sections. There will be no bumper corn crop this year.

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AGAINST WAR

People have not forgotten the last war, and they are not in favor of another one. This feeling is universal. Talk of the next armed conflict, with its slaughter and ruin, does violence to the peaceful inclinations of the masses from whom the substance of war must be drawn.

The Lincoln Journal, talks attentively to the words of a New York mother who protests against rearing children to be sacrificed on the altar of disputes that may be settled in courts of arbitration, and that newspaper quotes her as saying among other things that "if our civilization has any value, if life itself has any value, this problem of world peace must be solved beyond merely gracing the front pages of newspapers."

The Journal emphasizes the fact that pacifists were regarded as slackers during the war, but that now it is up to peace talk to prevent another war. That newspaper concludes: "No man should be a slacker when his country is in danger. That situation would not arise if the mothers of the world were organized against war. No country then would threaten war and no country would be placed in danger by other countries. Peace would reign and the mother's prayer for peace would be answered."

Registration of high school students will be held Friday and Saturday, September 6 and 7, between the hours of 9 a. m. and 3 p. m. As far as possible it is desired that the first and second year high school pupils register on Friday and the third and fourth year students on Saturday. Strict adherence to this schedule will not be enforced where circumstances make it impossible for pupils to be present at the designated time. The advantage to the school is that regular work will begin the first day of the term. 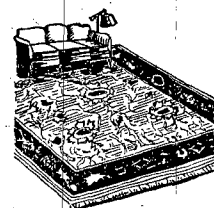

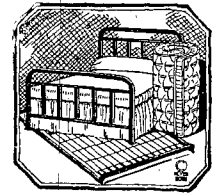

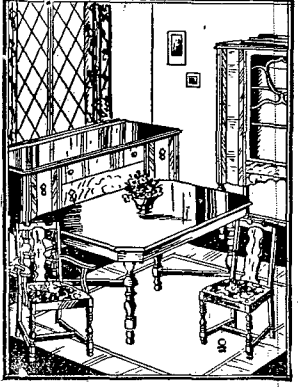
