Happy Chick News

It has been rather cold the last week March coming in like a lion. Maybe this is a sign for better weather later on.

Cold weather is just what those Happy Chick Brooders and Simplex Stoves like. It makes no difference what the temperature is outside, the chicks are more comfortable in a Happy Chick Brooder than if they were with the old hen.

Amos Beckenhauer ordered a six-pen hog house this week. He is going to use this house for hams. Amos was very careful in selecting a house because hams are very sensitive to cold.

I have been telling you the past two weeks of the different people who are buying Happy Chick Brooders and farrowing houses. Now I am going to tell you WHAT THEY are buying.

In the first place I am going to make a broad statement, they are buying the best house on the market dollar for dollar. We put more stinks under it, give you a double floor with paper between, then space the rafters two feet and make them double at the splices.

We weather-strip all our windows making them absolutely water and wind tight. We also use a specially designed window so the water cannot get in around the putty.

All windows are hinged to the bottom, have special hardware for locking and adjusting them in any desired position. On our roofs we use dressed and matched flooring, which we place on 87-pounding steel coated NULE-HIDE roofing fastened with a new metal stripping at all splices, and then turning a metal roof edge around the edge, thus leaving no piece for the wind to get under and tear it off or loosen it.

The best of clear, kim-berlin flooring is used on the side walls. All the doors are well braced, the main walk doors are full six foot high requiring no stooping or bumping the head to pass through.

Galvanized iron corners are used on all corners. Last, but not least, is the painting. The best of brooder house paint is used. The official color is red and I mean a RED. Of course, other colors can be had by giving us a short notice.



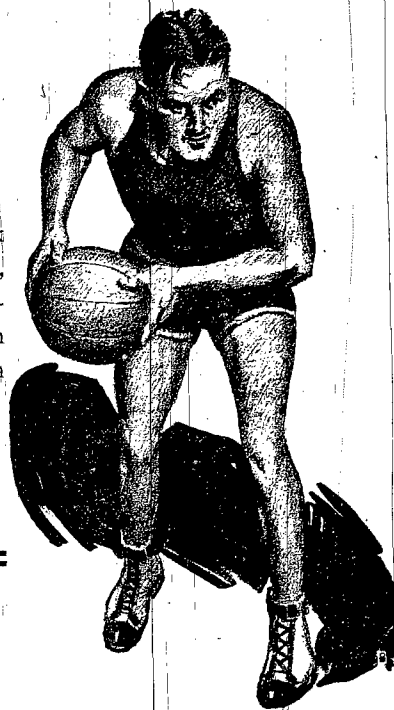

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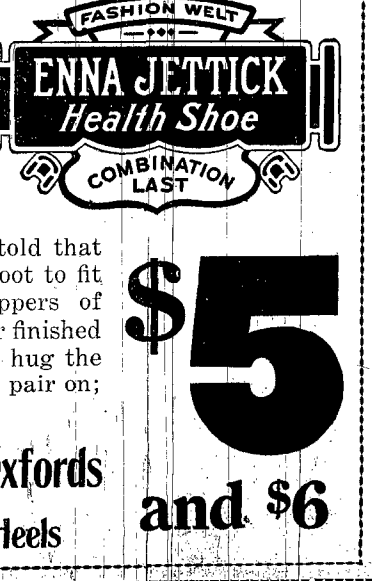
