Maintain Accredited Area Work Must Be Done By Periods.

Testing of cattle for tuberculosis in Wayne county, required to maintain the county's status as a modified tuberculosis-free accredited area, will be commenced Monday, April 13, under direction of the Nebraska Bureau of Almail Industry. Dr. D. M. Purdy who is in charge, will be located temporarily at Wayne during the period the work is conducted.

Approximately three years have passed since cattle in Wayne county herds were tested and the county herds were tested and the county herds were tested and decerated area. Under the uniform methods and rules governing the work in Nebraska, it becomes necessary to test the cattle in accredited area.
