For instance, the Union Pacific showed re-duction in operating revenues from \$48, 671,394 for the first three months in 1929 to \$37,549,505 for the same period in 1931. The Northwestern reported large reduc-tion in working forces, mentioning exten-sion of sections from leight to then miles. Other railroads made similarly unfavorable reports.

It would seem that the railroads have not always exer-pised highest wisdom, though working along business lines to make revenues jus-tify investments and operating costs. When returns appeared inadequate, passenger and freight rates were kept up. At the same time motor vehicles were multiply-ing with a steadily growing extension of transportation developed and business volume slipped away from the railroads, passonger rates were reduced as an ex-periment. With motor vehicles establish-ded, revenues could not have been satis-factorily increased. We would say that lack of wisdom was shown in the tardiness with which rates were lowered, though berhaps results could not have been ma-erially changed.

People will not patronize them if dvantage lies in employing trucks, buses or private cars, but restrictions on motor arriers should be equally as strong as those aposed on railroads.
