













COUNTY BOARD.

Wayne, Nebraska, June 2, 1931.

Board met as per adjournment. All members present. Minutes of meeting held May 19, 1931, read and approved.

Comes new Don R. Shearer and 351 other citizens, taxpayers, and patrons of the highway described below, and file the following petition which is in words and figures as follows:

Have the undersigned citizens, taxpayers and patrons of the proposed highway described below, hereby respectfully petition the Honorable Governor of Nebraska and state highway engineer to designate State Aid Road for immediate construction as follows:

Section 16 point on Federal highway No. 35 on the first section line west of Wislida, Nebraska, due north to a point east of Belden, Nebraska, connecting with Federal highway No. 20, being a distance of sixteen and one-half miles and which will connect three townships and two main highways.

Be it therefore resolved by the board of county commissioners of Wayne county, Nebraska, that we recommend and urge the department of public works of the state of Nebraska to act favorably upon said petitions at the earliest date possible or as soon as such funds are available to begin such work.

Comes now E. J. Hunter and says that for the year 1930 he was assessed with a valuation of \$2,100.00 on Lot 8 and S. 3 ft. of lot 7, block 13, original Wayne, and with a valuation of \$2,000.00 on improvements on said lots, total tax amounting to \$165.64. That he paid said tax under protest for the reason that possession was given him March 1, but that he tore down the old buildings during the month of March and that there were no buildings on the lots on April 1 and the new building was not ready for occupancy until June 15. He now asks that the county treasurer be ordered to refund part of such tax.

On motion such protest is rejected and the county treasurer is ordered to distribute the funds.

J. M. Cherry, county judge, orders the payment of a mother's pension to Lizzie Longnecker, for \$30.00 per month, for a period of 6 months, beginning May 1, 1931, for the support of her minor children, Harold Longnecker, Hattie Longnecker and Edna Longnecker, all of which is duly approved by the board, and the county clerk is hereby ordered to draw such warrants.

CITY COUNCIL.

Wayne, Neb., June 9, 1931.

The regular meeting of the City Council was held in the Council Rooms in the City Hall in Wayne, Nebraska, with the following members present, to-wit: Councilmen: Lewis, Miller, Wright, Ellis and Horney; James E. Brittain, City Attorney and W. S. Bressler, City Clerk.

The meeting was called to order by acting Mayor Lewis and the minutes of the last regular meeting were read and approved.

The following bills were examined, read and on motion allowed and warrants ordered drawn to-wit:

Table listing various bills and payments, including Bert Graham, Acme Petroleum Co., Wayne Herald, etc.

Reading and Passage of Ordinance Number 364.

Ordinance No. 364 was introduced and read for the first time, providing for and making the annual appropriation of the city of Wayne, Nebraska, for the fiscal year commencing May 1, 1931.

It was moved by Councilman Horney and seconded by Councilman Wright that the rules requiring an Ordinance to be read on three separate days be dispensed with and that Ordinance No. 364 be passed to its second reading.

On roll call by the chairman the following members voted "yea" to-wit: Lewis, Miller, Wright, Ellis and Horney. None voting "no" motion was declared carried and ordinance No. 364 was read for the second time.

Motion was made by Miller that the rules requiring an Ordinance to be read on three separate days be dispensed with and that Ordinance No. 364 be passed to its third and last reading.

Motion was made by Miller and seconded by Ellis that Ordinance No. 364 be passed as read. Motion put by the Chairman and on Roll Call the following members voted "yea" to-wit: Lewis, Miller, Wright, Ellis and Horney. None voting "no" motion was declared carried and ordinance No. 364 was duly passed and is as follows:

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WAYNE, NEBRASKA: Section 1. There is hereby appropriated from the Light Fund of said city for the fiscal year commencing May 1, 1931, for operating, maintaining and extending the electric light plant of said city, the sum of \$60,000.00.

Section 2. There is hereby appropriated from the General Fund of said city for the fiscal year commencing May 1, 1931, for the general purposes, the sum of \$22,500.00.

Section 3. There is hereby appropriated from the Sewer Fund of said city for the fiscal year commencing May 1, 1931, for maintaining and repairing sewers, the sum of \$1,200.00.

Section 4. There is hereby appropriated from the Park Fund of said city for the fiscal year commencing May 1, 1931, for maintaining city parks, the sum of \$2,000.00.

Section 5. There is hereby appropriated from the General Fund of said city, for the fiscal year commencing May 1, 1931, for repairing, maintaining and improving the streets and alleys of said city, the sum of \$8,500.00.

Section 6. There is hereby appropriated from the Library Fund of said city, for the fiscal year commencing May 1, 1931, for maintaining the city library, the sum of \$3,000.00.

Section 7. There is hereby appropriated from the Bonds Fund of said city for the fiscal year commencing May 1, 1931, for the payment of interest and creating a sinking fund for the payment of bonds, the sum of \$17,000.00.

Section 8. There is hereby appropriated for the fiscal year commencing May 1, 1931, for maintaining the Fire Department of

Motion put by the Chairman and on "Roll Call" the following members voted "yea" to-wit: Lewis, Miller, Wright, Ellis and Horney. None voting "no" motion was declared carried and Ordinance No. 365 was duly passed and is as follows:

Ordinance No. 365. An Ordinance creating and establishing a certain Improvement District within the City of Wayne, Nebraska, to be designated and known as Paving District No. 10; defining and fixing the limits and boundaries thereof; providing for securing plans and specifications for the grading, draining and paving of the expense thereof, and estimates of the expense thereof, and providing for the assessment of the expense thereof, and for the issuance of District Paving Bonds or District Paving Warrants to pay the cost and expense of said improvement.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WAYNE, NEBRASKA: Section 1. That for the purpose of grading, draining, and paving certain alleys situated within and forming part of the real estate hereinafter described, a certain Improvement District, hereby designated Paving District No. 10, is hereby created and established in said City.

Motion was made by Miller and seconded by Wright that Acting Mayor and Clerk be instructed to enter into a contract with the Geo. Zieg Co. for the repairing and painting of the stand pipe. Motion carried.

It was moved by Horney and seconded by Miller that the Acting Mayor order the police to remove the obstruction in front of the East 50 feet, Lot 5, Block 1, Spahr's Addition to the City of Wayne, Motion carried.

Motion to adjourn. Motion carried.

## Accident Report Given For Period

### Motor Vehicle Casualties Lead in Nebraska for Past Two Weeks.

Accident statistics as compiled by the Nebraska Press association and the rehabilitation division of the state department of vocational education for the two-week period ending June 2, 1931, are as follows:

Of the 523 persons injured, 30 were permanently disabled, Swimming claimed the lives of 4 persons. Causes of other accidents in the field of sport were: Riding, 9; baseball, 11; track, 3; golf, 1; gunshot, 4; others, 2.  
Other public accidents caused 27 injuries, one disability and two deaths.  
Accidents in industry are divided as follows: Falls, 10; struck by falling object, 6; caught in power machinery, 10; other causes, 13.  
Twenty five farmers were injured and 1 was disabled while using farm machinery such as tractors, disks, harrows and corn listers. Farm animals were responsible for 6 injuries from run-aways, 13 injuries from kicks and 12 injuries in other accidents. Seven farmers were injured and 1 was disabled by falls and 15 others were injured in various ways.  
Falls in the home caused 41 injuries and 5 disabilities. Burns and scalds were the result of 17 accidents in the home of which 3 were fatal. Five persons had their arms crushed and bruised in electric wringers.

Twenty skids and 11 blowouts caused accidents in which 38 persons were injured; 17 drivers lost control of their cars with the result that 25 persons were injured. 12 speeders were responsible for 7 injuries, 2 disabilities and 1 death; 20 reckless drivers caused injury to 35 persons. Three drivers passing cars met other cars head-on; 11

persons were injured and 2 were killed.	
Of the 23 pedestrians struck by cars, 11 were adults and 12 were children. Two children were killed and one child and 2 adults were permanently disabled.
