THE executive council of Up Wages the American Rederation of Up Wages the American Rederation of Up Wages Labor has issued a statement urging that wage scales must be maintained to keep up the purchasing power of the masses. We believe liberal wages are important to increased demand. We think highest possible compensation is always advisable if everything else is up in proportion. But when values along all lines sib, it would seem necessary for organized labor to contribute its share to new and lowered levels. It is better to accept reduced wages than no wages, and many people out of employment show a lack of normal buying and selling.

The farmer suffers from lack of consumption, lack of purchasing power on the part of others. It would be better for agriculture if industrial operatives everywhere were raid high wages and thus were enabled to buy more farm products. The result would stimulate farm prices.

But since there is much unemployment and underconsumption and farm prices are down, it seems reasonable for labor to accept a fair reduction in order to cheapen production and increase purchase of manufactured goods. In looking out for their




