### Farmers Always Study On Crops

#### Herald In Nineties Has Commentary On State of County Crops

Its own commentary on crop conditions is an edition of the Wayne Herald dated August 13, 1891. Says that old paper: "Corn at 35 cents per bushel and not many caring to sell, even at that! It's enough to make one sick to think of the millions of bushels of Nebraska corn that went out at 15 cents last winter and spring. Potatoes are potatoes this year. A dollar a bushel, and not very plentiful at that. A gentleman informed us that he had a letter from southwestern Iowa, in which it was stated that potatoes are bringing two dollars a bushel."

It is said that the average yield of wheat in Wayne county that year would be 18 bushels to the acre, with many fields turning out excellent yields. They were quoted at \$2.50 a ton early in the season, and higher prices were being promised. Lumber prices were scheduled for an advance of five cents after the fifteenth of August.

#### How To Harvest

One of the interesting facts about that year's harvest was noted in the Herald, which mentioned the following: "After the hail storm that did so much damage to small grain on the strip south and west of town, many of the farmers at once plowed up the grain fields to put in some other crop. Among others, Robert Cunningham did so, only he left a portion of his wheat to see what would come of it. When spring came, he gave a good crop of excellent wheat, and he now laments that he did not let the entire field alone."

W. W. Whitman performing the ceremony. Miss Altha Gillilan of Magnet and Phil Mitchell, college student, accompanied them.

The young couple went to Wausau after the wedding to visit the bride's mother. They will leave soon for Douglas, Wyo., where Mr. Terry teaches.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Terry are former students at the college in Wayne, the former having finished three courses and the latter one year's work.

### Gas Pipe Lines To Serve New Towns

One hundred new towns will be served with natural gas, before 1932, say officials of the Northern System in referring to progress being made in pipeline development. Nebraska towns on the list are the following, and more may be included: Adams, Ashland, Bancroft, Eldorado, Elmwood, Emerson, Johnson, Louisville, Palmyra, Pender, Valley, Wakefield, Waterloo, Wayne, Weeping Water and West Point.

The system has, in its 15 months of existence, invested more than \$30,000,000 in pipe lines and other equipment. States the company report: "Of the pipe lines planned, 985 miles are now being planned, 415 miles of major pipe line construction are under way at the present time. The cities and communities now being served are in Kansas, Nebraska and Iowa, where a division of serving units has been devised."

### Wheat To Make Feed Supplement

Lincoln, Neb.—With most Nebraska pastures dried up, many dairy herd improvement association members and other dairymen are finding it necessary to feed grain to their cows, according to E. C. Scheidehelm of the agricultural college in Lincoln. Scheidehelm, chairman at the college, suggests that Nebraska dairymen feed some wheat in their rations. Under present price conditions, he believes it is cheaper to feed wheat rather than corn. Some dairymen who have used wheat, however, say that it tends to slow

up the milk production. Nevertheless the College of Agriculture man says a ration made of one-fourth of one-third wheat will not hurt the cows.

A mixture consisting of 300 pounds ground wheat, 300 pounds ground oats, 300 pounds ground barley of corn, along with 100 pounds of either cottonseed or linseed meal is suggested. Another mixture includes 500 pounds ground corn or barley, 500 pounds oats and 100 pounds of either cottonseed or linseed meal.

The more milk a cow produces the more grain she should be fed now, Scheidehelm maintains. Jerseys and Guernseys producing up to 20 pounds of milk should receive one pound of grain for every seven pounds of milk while those producing from 30 to 35 pounds should get one pound of grain for each 4½ pounds of milk.

Holsteins, Ayrshire and other cattle require about the same amount of grain for each pound of milk produced.

Ebright, Omaha, was re-elected vice president; Mrs. Ethel Bauer, Ponca, recording secretary; Mrs. F. L. Sturtevant, Lincoln, statistician, and Mrs. Claude Dewald, Omaha, treasurer. Mrs. Dewald and Mrs. N. L. Hansen, Emerson were elected delegates to the bi-annual convention of the Women's Missionary society of the United Lutheran church at Baltimore in October.

### RADIO CORPORATION MAY BUY ISLAND

Madison, Neb.—Although Adolph Platt of Madison will make no statement, it is understood that he is negotiating with the Radio Corporation of America for the sale of his island, which is located just west of Madison.

When the deal is completed the Radio corporation will install a broadcasting station on the island. Platt recently traded his farm west of Madison for a 160-acre farm six miles northwest of Plainville, retaining the island of 11 acres to sell to the corporation.

### Give Out Report On Gasoline Tax

Treasurer Is Pleased At Collections for July As His Statement.

Gasoline tax collections in Nebraska totaled \$937,005.39 for the month of July. State Treasurer T. W. Baas has announced. The state is \$200,000 ahead of its collections for the same period of a year ago, he added.

Wayne county's payment was \$2,029.89; Cedar county, \$2,555.94; Douglas county, \$28,091.96 and Lancaster county, \$15,741.91. The smallest payment in the state was \$195.56, which went to Hooker county.

### Nebraska Holds Full Quota of Motor Vehicles

Nebraskans like automobiles, if the figures of the census survey are to be taken as a standard. In 1930, the state had a total of 367,410 automobiles, of which 244,645 were in the towns. That left a total of 122,765 cars for farmers, an average of nearly one car for each farm in the state. The statement also reveals one pleasure car for each 3.75 persons in Nebraska.

Trucks have been discovered to be very useful in hauling produce from farm to town, so 20,473 trucks have been listed on farms in the state. The remaining 38,169 trucks bear town licenses.

Tractors in the state in 1930 numbered 38,524 and there were 36,296 gas engines. Grain threshers made a total of 13,145, but there were only 3,391 combines in Nebraska.

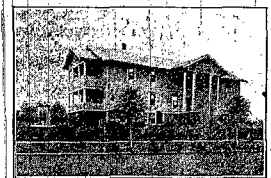
