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Consolidation. Geneva Signal: A few days ago the Lincoln Journal and the Lincoln Star published a joint statement announcing that the advertising in both papers would be handled jointly by one advertising force, the editorial and news department to remain separate as heretofore. If two Fillmore county newspapers were to make such an announcement the public would consider that the two papers had practically consolidated.

Only the publishers of the Journal and the Star know how far the consolidation has gone, or will go, but it can be seen from the announcement that one-half of the advertising composition cost will be saved, as each newspaper can publish the same advertising by merely casting additional plates. The announcement said the arrangement had been made for the sake of economy. The economy could include two factors, a smaller number of advertising solicitors and the saving in the cost of advertising composition. Lincoln merchants use the same advertisements in the two papers to a large extent.

Another interesting item is the fact that the Lincoln Journal is preparing to erect a fine modern printing plant at the corner of 13th and seems reasonable to expect that when the new building is erected the mechanical plants of the Journal and the Star will be united for the sake of further economy and both Journal and Star will be produced from the new plant. Somewhat similar consolidations are taking place all over the country.

A suggestion that all of the Fillmore county newspapers might unite and accomplish economies in news gathering and mechanical

production that would make it feasible to publish a remarkably fine weekly newspaper for the whole county or possibly a semi-weekly or tri-weekly, or even a daily newspaper, would still sound humorous, but scarcely more humorous than would have sounded the suggestion a year or two ago that the Lincoln Journal and Lincoln Star would go as far toward consolidation as they have already gone by their own announcement, to say nothing of what they are likely to do when the new printing plant is ready for use.

Newspaper readers are demanding so much these days in the way of complete coverage of large communities, meaning country as well as town, in news gathering and in advertising service that publishers have to travel fast to keep them satisfied. The day of the political organ and the personal organ of an ambitious individual is just about over. It isn't so many years since every politician felt he must have his own newspaper organ to help boost him into office. Such an organ is considered a handicap now.

In the good old days, if they were good, many a local banker insisted on having his own local newspaper organ. There are a number of towns in Nebraska in which two banks kept two newspapers alive and fighting each other when the patronage of the community scarcely warranted the publication of one newspaper. Other similar circumstances extended the life of many other newspapers beyond their legitimate longevity.

Several years ago the wave of newspaper consolidation started in the country weekly field. Hundreds of small newspapers suspended through consolidation or want of patronage. The wave has

been extending to the daily field and the consolidation at Lincoln is the most recent notable example. Calm-minded, thinking newspaper readers know that newspaper consolidation is giving them much more for their money than they formerly got, and that to patronize a very small and inefficient newspaper just to be a good fellow is merely making a donation and is not really helping the community.

Consolidating Counties. Omaha Daily Journal Stockman: The movement which is on foot to consolidate two Nebraska counties, Holt and Boyd, promises a lighter burden of taxes for the people of that section without any reduction in governmental services. Just how such a proposal would work out in the final analysis is difficult to say. Certainly it should not be undertaken without the consent and desire of the voters, but the benefits to be derived are alluring, especially at such a time as this.

It is no secret that the division of many mid-western states into counties was done at the behest of local owners and politicians who craved personal advantages, and Nebraska's experience was no exception. Little consideration was given future possible needs for local government when counties were established. The minds of influential persons were confused with the rosy claims of speculators and grafters. More recent years have given some indication of how the country is likely to develop and in a measure the density of population which each county may support. Doubtless the most economical size of county governmental area can be judged better in the

light of experience than in the days of pioneers. Union of two or more counties should not be made without careful consideration of the difficulties involved. The citizenry of each area are accustomed to managing their own affairs and unless they favor merging with their neighbors, trouble may be expected. Such a consolidation should not be considered merely as a measure to help combat the present rather difficult economic period. When times change for the better, such a union might not show up in such a favorable light. With present methods of travel and communication, however, it must be admitted that the citizens scattered over large areas of rather sparsely settled country should be able to govern themselves with fewer sets of county officials and attendant expense just as well as under the present conditions. If Holt and Boyd counties unite and find the experiment successful, doubtless other thinly settled counties will give the matter consideration.

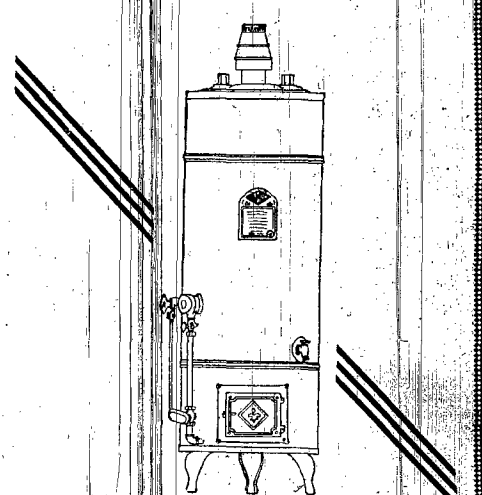

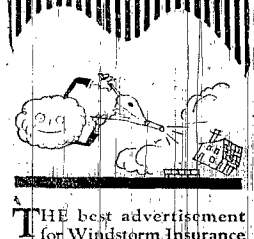
