



### Municipal Water Softener Goes Into Use At Plant In Ames, Iowa

An abundance of soft water to be used for every purpose is a dream that has come true for users of water from the municipal plant at Ames, Iowa, report Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Jacques, who visited their daughter and her son-in-law there Sunday and Monday. The city has installed water-softening apparatus which accomplishes the task of water softening without undue expense to the city and at a decided saving to the individual user.

Early last spring, J. H. Ames, city manager, issued a report describing various ways of softening water. From this report we quote remarks on the method which the people of Ames found most acceptable.

**To Soften Water.**  
Water may be softened, the engineer reported, by the use of soap, lime, or soda ash, or by the zeolite method. In the last-named process, said the report, "Use is made of the base exchange properties of the zeolite mineral by taking up the calcium and magnesium salts in the water for the sodium in zeolite. The zeolite is then regenerated by means of salt, and the calcium and magnesium salts are released by the zeolite for the sodium in the sodium chloride. This process is repeated over and over again without appreciable loss of the original zeolite mineral."

### Quarter Of Year Closes At College

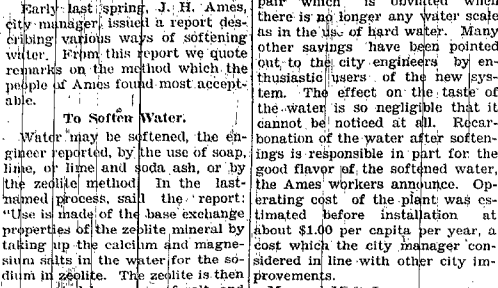
Stunt Night Program Is Being Arranged Here This November.

### Roll Call Will Be Held Saturday

Supt. Best Announces City Will Be Canvassed by Volunteer Group.

To do one's bit now is quite as important as it was in the day of war, Red Cross officials are reminding people since the beginning of the national Roll Call which extends from November 11 to November 26. Supt. H. R. Best of the public schools is in charge of local arrangements, and announces that Saturday, November 14, will be the big day in Wayne.

High school teachers and others will give their time to the task of canvassing the town on Saturday. The young women will be directed to call on no one more than once.

One dollar pays a membership fee in the Red Cross. The money is divided between national and county uses, one half of the entire sum being used in the alleviation of suffering which takes on national importance. The other fifty percent of the money is used in the assistance of the poor and needy in the area under the jurisdiction of the county organization.

Have Many Fields.  
The Red Cross, its officers remind the public, has many fields in which it operates. After half a century of service to the people of this country, the Red Cross has acquired a record of assisting the needy in such disasters as the Johnstown flood, the San Francisco fire, the Florida hurricanes, the Nicaragua earthquake, and the droughts of the past two years.

Training in life saving, in first aid, and in hygiene is given in classes sponsored by the Red Cross. Home conditions of the poor and needy are investigated by the Red Cross, and help is given where it is needed. The Red Cross ends its first half century with pride in its record of service. Each membership fee of \$1 will help the Red Cross to further its record for service in great disasters and in small but important needs of the world. It is to this end that solicitors will ask your help and your membership fee on Saturday, November 14, when Wayne will be canvassed.

### Pour Concrete For New Diesel

### Engineers Make Changes In Municipal Plant for Light and Power.

Pouring of concrete for the new Diesel engine foundation at the municipal light plant began today, announces S. A. Hemple, city engineer. Mr. Hemple is pleased with progress being made in preparations for the installation of the new Diesel engine unit which will be ready for its test run December 18.

Excavation for the new foundation required the removal of 320 square feet of old flooring, most of which was under the old boiler. In this excavation, fresh concrete will be poured, and on it the new unit will rest.

Walls of the plant have been squared to make room for the new unit, and new stretches of brick wall, north and south and east and west, are now complete. These walls replace the old crosswise wall which was placed in the plant when the first boilers were installed.

Except from a recent editorial in Saturday Evening Post:  
"Are you afraid to buy normally? Buy more, spend more, eat more, campaigns are futile. But if you do not buy normally in accordance with your present means—and a large part of the population is substantially in its buying—you are simply perpetuating the vicious circle in which we have been traveling. To paint, to repair, to increase neighborhood employment, to buy sensibly, though not extravagantly, in short, to live according to your means, will bring about a steady amelioration of the depression. Some rich and well-to-do people are as yellow as their gold."  
"Are you afraid of your leaders? The best and bravest leaders in the world cannot lead towards in a charge. Grant that many of them might be better—a lot better, but you selected and elected them. You will get nowhere by running around in circles and waiting for some new and miraculous plan or force to change things overnight, or for some Moses to stand forth and lead you into the promised land. The men, the elements, the material with which we have to work, are all known to us."  
"Most of our fears will run away if we face them. Courage and common sense will conquer situations that look desperate to the timid. The New Day that our bright young writers, and some older ones who are not so bright, talk so glibly and so vaguely about, will in the end come from the same old sun, with some of the mists burned away. But the sun and the moon and the stars change slowly; and the laws that govern human nature, human actions and human growth will be changed or modified only over fairly long periods of time. Meteorites may blaze up fiercely in the night, but their glory is short-lived and then they fall to earth. Slow and orderly advance alone is tolerated in the scheme of things. But there is nothing to be afraid of in that."
