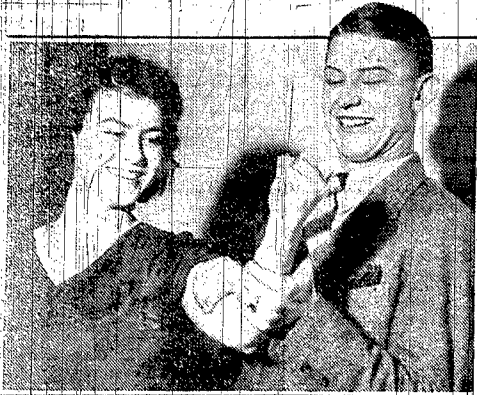

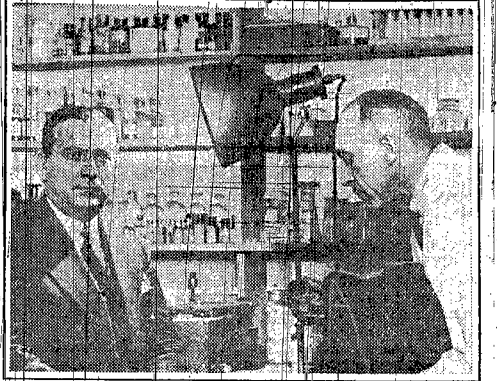

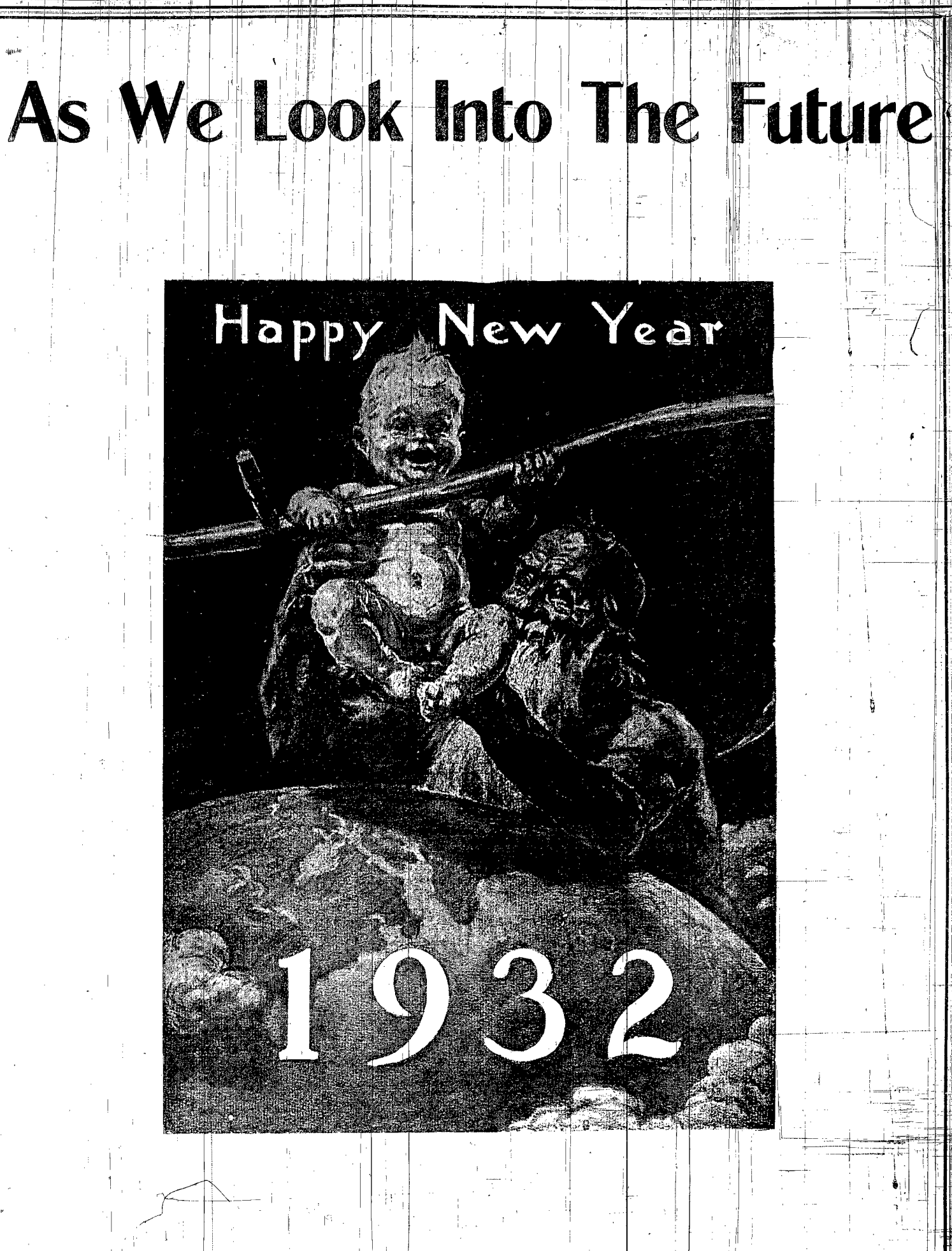

Firemen Answer Alarms

Alarms Recorded in the Past Year
When the siren sounds, and the red fire trucks are rushed out of the station, there is a moment's excitement, and one of the highlights in the life of a fireman. Wayne fire department answered 26 fire calls this year, and 30 calls last year. This year, seven of the calls were to fires in cars.

According to records kept at the city hall, the first fire of the year was February 17, 1931, at the residence of Mrs. Henry Kay. The year's second fire, that of March 8, was also the most serious, for it gutted the Jeffrey Style shop building. This structure has been rebuilt, and is occupied by offices now.

March 8, firemen answered a call to the John Vennberg farm.

where grass was burning, threatening buildings. A coupe located north of one of the halls at the State Teachers college burned March 26.

Variety of Causes.
Fires during the last year were attributable, as usual, to a variety of causes. There were only about three serious conflagrations during the year, an admirable record.

A fire occurred at the air port on April 12; one at the Dew Drop Inn on April 21, and the Ley automobile caught fire April 25. April 27, there was a fire at the C. T. Norton place.

A car standing near the Candy Kitchen burned June 7, and a Chevrolet standing near the court house caught fire June 25. A blaze at the Dr. J. C. Johnson house

called out the department on the morning of July 13, and the firemen went to the country July 27, to answer a call at the Ben Nissen farm, where a barn burned.

On July 28, a light transformer caught fire; and July 29, there was a fire at the J. H. Murray place. September 6 there was a blaze at the Chan Norton place, and September 17, a Swift and Company truck caused trouble.

Number Is Small.
Dr. Jamison's residence was the scene of a small fire September 19, and there was also a fire at the Boyd Hotel October 1. A car on Blaine street caught fire October 9, and the department was called.

Another large fire of last year was on October 23, when Walter Savidge's show train burned in the

yards where it had been standing. On November 2, a car blazed at the A. Dolph place and November 10, Carl Madsen's residence had a rather serious fire.

Kasper Korn had a barn fire November 12; and Len Hunter had a chimney blaze November 13. On November 21 the Kay dance pavilion south of town was burned to the ground, the third serious conflagration of the year, and one involving large loss of money. A small fire was the cause of a fire call to the Recco-McGee construction company offices on November 26.
