"Boys who wish to attend the camps should apply at once," warned Paul Mines, county chairman in charge of the work, "for interest in the camps seems greater this year than any other."

The boys from Wayne county will attend camp for one month at Fort Crook, where they will receive military and civil instruction which will benefit them. Their expenses while in camp are paid, as is their railroad fare, which will be refunded on arrival at the post. Young men who attend Citizens' Military Training Camps, it should be understood, are in no way placed under obligation to the government or to the United States army.

Wayne People Give Views On Ways To Make Improvements In City

If you were asked the question, "What can be done to make Wayne a better town?" or "batter "Can you think of any civic improvements that might be made in Wayne?" what would you say? Most of us...

der "appeared" in "Early Days in Wayne County." "Wayne needs a general clean-up, like they had in 1916," Mr. Theobald stated. Alleys, corners, yards and grounds should be policed and made to look entirely different, and spring is the logical time to do it. Alleys are particularly bad places for all sorts of rubbish to collect. Besides being unsightly they are the worst kind of fire traps when littered up or partially blocked with waste material. Mr. Theobald brought up the question of disposal of garbage. A regular garbage route should be established, he thinks, which would take care of the present problem of having to let such stuff accumulate in secluded corners. The less of this sort of material that is left to lie around in the open there is, the less trouble people are going to have with flies during the summer months. Anything that will help solve the fly problem is worthy of consideration.
Carl E. Wright went outside the field of concrete things and announced that he wanted to see Wayne organize a booster club. "A town often-times has many things available that people don't know about," he pointed out. "A booster club brings out these special advantages." Mr. Wright cited the instance of the free electric installation that the city offered to anyone who wanted to use it. "People didn't know about it until we advertised it," Mr. Wright explained. Concurrent in Mr. Wright's opinion on the booster club were Martin Ringer and H. J. Miner. A chamber of commerce seemed to be the one club that they unanimously agreed would do the most good, and each one was equally as warm in his praise of splendid work done in Wayne by the Kiwanis club. "But," as they put it, "we need a club devoted primarily to business interests, and organized under a paid secretary." With such an organization in operation Wayne would have a real business promotion club, devoted entirely to business, without the double purpose of acting as both business and social club. Mr. Carhart, however, was emphatic in his refutation of the need for a commercial club. "Kiwanis has done more for the town than any organization and it is sufficient," he said.
H. J. Miner gave voice to one of the finest tributes the city could be paid. "Wayne is one of the best towns I know of," he declared. "The people in it are unselfish and they are progressive. I don't know of any better place to trade than in Wayne."
So, even with all the many improvements and progressive steps that Wayne has taken there is still room for improvement. There will always be room for improvement. No city ever reaches the acme of perfection. But all this blends into the atmosphere that greets the newcomer and it is the thing that gives him his impression of the city.
Wayne may justly be proud of her numerous beautiful homes and her well kept streets and lawns. There are very few places that equal it. Wayne may boast, too, of the progressive spirit that permeates to every part of the city and everybody in it. In the face of conditions that are admittedly adverse there is an outspoken feeling of true optimism that gets into a man's system and buoy him up. An outsider is singularly impressed with the cheerful view with which everybody looks at a picture that is painted so black in his own home town. But above all the friendliness of the people in Wayne is the most outstanding thing that one sees. When two or three thousand people can live neighbors and yet each retain his individual identity then a city approaches as near the ideal community as it is possible to form.

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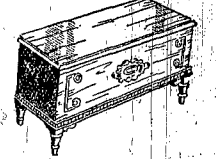
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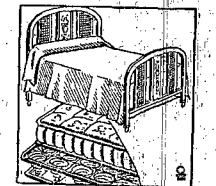

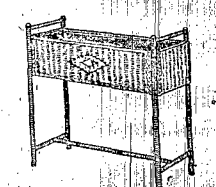
