# Home Fried Recipes

**String Beans.**  
(Mrs. A. L. Nuerberger, Wakefield)  
Prepare 2 quarts fresh beans in usual way for cooking.  
Cook until tender, season with tablespoons fryings of butter, salt to taste. 1-2 teaspoon chili powder. 15 minutes before serving ice a good sized onion into the frying dish with 2 tablespoons vinegar. Turn the boiling hot pans over this and serve. Beans may be cooked with meat and used with the onion, the same.

**Harvard Beets.**  
(Mrs. A. L. Nuerberger, Wakefield)  
Prepare beets in the usual way and dice.  
Sauce:  
1-4 cup vinegar  
1-4 cup water  
1-4 cup sugar  
1 1-2 tablespoons butter  
2 teaspoons cornstarch  
Blend with a little cold water and cook. Add beets and simmer until hot.

**Buttered Carrots.**  
(Mrs. A. L. Nuerberger, Wakefield)  
Scrape fresh carrots  
Cut in eighths  
Cook until tender. Salt.  
Add chopped parsley, to melted butter and pour over carrots.

**Browned New Potatoes.**  
(Mrs. A. L. Nuerberger, Wakefield)  
Cook small new potatoes until tender. Salt. Brown these in a skillet with 1-4 cup butter and fryings. Sprinkle with chopped parsley.

**Marmalade.**  
(Mrs. E. L. Gale, Des Moines)  
2 oranges  
1 grape fruit  
Juice of 1 lemon  
Chop through food chopper and oranges (none of the white)  
Add 5 cups water  
Pulp of grape fruit and oranges cut into small pieces  
Let stand over night.  
Boil until thick, using same amount of sugar as of liquid mixture.

**Imperial Sunshine Cake.**  
(Mrs. E. L. Gale, Des Moines)  
7-8 cup sifted Swans Down flour  
1-2 teaspoon cream of tartar  
1-4 teaspoon salt  
1 1-4 cups sifted sugar  
1-3 cup water  
5 egg whites, stiffly beaten  
5 egg yolks, beaten until thick and lemon colored  
1 teaspoon flavoring  
Sift flour once, measure, add cream of tartar and salt, and sift together four times. Boil sugar and water until a small amount of syrup forms a soft ball in cold water, or spins a long thread. Pour syrup in fine stream over egg whites, beating constantly. Continue beating as mixture cools. Fold in egg yolks and flavoring; then flour, a small amount at a time. Pour into ungreased tub pan. Bake in slow oven (350) 30 minutes then decrease heat to 325 and bake 30 minutes longer. Remove from oven and invert pan one hour, or until cold.  
(Really a two-man cake, one fellow for whites and one for yolks.)

**Date Ice Box Cookies.**  
(Betty Clobber, by Mrs. E. L. Gale)  
1 cup shortening  
2 cups brown sugar (packed light)  
2 eggs  
1 cup nut meats  
1 cup dates cut fine  
3 1-2 cups Gold Medal flour  
1 teaspoon soda  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
Cream sugar and shortening. Add beaten eggs, nuts, dates (grind 'em) vanilla, flour, soda and salt. Mix with hands. Form into rolls 2 inches in diameter. Wrap in waxed paper and chill. Slice 1-8 inch thick and bake 8 to 10 minutes in 375 degree oven in ungreased tins. Makes 8 dozen small cookies. Dough keeps for days in refrigerator.

**Ice Cream.**  
(Mrs. Harry Bennett)  
Put 1-2 gallon milk on to heat and scald. Beat 6 eggs with 2 cups of sugar for 15 minutes or longer. Add 3 tablespoons flour or cornstarch to eggs and sugar and place mixture into scalded milk. Let come to boil. When cool add 1-2 gallon of cream and pour into 6 quart freezer. Add enough milk to fill freezer within 3 inches of top. Flavor with vanilla, maple or other extract and freeze.

**Baked Cabbage.**  
(Mrs. William Beck)  
Cook cabbage until tender. Prepare white sauce of two tablespoons butter, two tablespoons flour. Add milk. Season with pepper and salt. When thickened, pour over two well beaten eggs. Pour sauce over cabbage in buttered baking dish. Cover with bread crumbs and bake.

Mrs. Sarah E. Woods, nee Jones, daughter of David and Sarah Jones, was born April 20, 1847, at Carlingham, Wales, and departed this life at her home in Carroll June 28, 1932, at the age of 85 years, 2 months and 8 days. Her early days were spent in the quiet country of Cardiganshire and in a home of strictly Calvinistic faith. That faith she received and clung to to the very end without a doubt. When about 12 years of age she was received into full membership of the Calvinistic church of that place. Early in life she went over the threshold of the old homestead to battle life as she used to say for herself. Young and influenced by Sunday school training she turned to the world with her heart and mind filled with determination to do good.

In 1868 she left her native land and came to America with her parents and settled in Johnson county, near Iowa City, Iowa. Having one week of rest after the long and tiresome journey from Cardiganshire, she started to work in a farm home. The second Sunday after their arrival the family was received into the Calvinistic fellowship.

On April 8, 1870, deceased was married to John Woods and to this union were born nine children, six of whom survive as follows: Edwin Woods and Mrs. George H. Cooper of Red Oak, Iowa, Mrs. Griffith Edwards, Mrs. John Jones, Mrs. John L. Jones and Mrs. D. J. Davis of Carroll. Two children died in infancy and the eldest daughter, Mrs. John Francis, died October 10, 1914.

In 1871 the Woods family moved by covered wagon from Johnson county to Red Oak which was only a prairie at that time. They and a Davis family were then the only persons at Red Oak. They spent many years overcoming hardships and they also enjoyed many blessings. The head of the church was there giving unto them to the fullness of their hearts the real joy of life.

In 1907 the family came to Carroll and from then until her death Mrs. Woods was a faithful member of the Presbyterian church. Mrs. Woods was of generous and pleasant disposition, always kind and courageous. She had a religious temperament and the church and its welfare were close to her heart. Many times she expressed disappointment because of being unable to attend services. Her favorite preacher was Rev. Hugh C. Griffith and she enjoyed telling of his sermons. Through her many years of failing health she said, "The Lord has some purpose in this." She desired that her children be truthful, clean and honest. To her death was a gain.

Mr. Woods predeceased her in death 16 years. Deceased leaves her six children, 20 grandchildren and 18 great grandchildren. Grandsons who were pallbearers are Darwin and Clifford Francis, Edwin, Lemuel and Delwin Jones, Glenn Woods, Paul Cooper and David Edwards.
