Returning to Cork, Father Kearns' party drove by bus to Killarney, a pretty, up-to-date little town, and then proceeded on horseback across the Gap of Dunlow.

Crops Estimated Good For State

Conditions In Nebraska Favor Good Yields Of Grain And Hay.

The estimate of corn is 249,435,000 bushels; all wheat, 23,736,000 bushels; oats, 72,954,000 bushels; barley, 20,654,000 bushels and all hay, 4,920,000 tons, according to the August report of the state and federal division of agricultural statistics.

Hay Crop Is Large. Hay crops are very good. The first and second crop of alfalfa were fair and since the rains the third crop is promising.

Cattle On Feed Fewer In State

Conditions Indicate Rise In Feeding Operations For This Fall.

Nebraska has 22 percent less cattle on feed August 1 as on August 1 a year ago, according to the state and federal division of agricultural statistics.

Feeding operations in Nebraska have been greatly reduced on account of the short grain and hay crops of last year which resulted in a very small carry-over of these crops.

Lady Is Postmaster. Pendie, Neb., Aug. 11—Mrs. Bessie Fried, 30, whose husband is an invalid, has begun her work after appointment as postmistress here.

No Bonded Debts. Lincoln, Neb.—Ralph C. Lawrence, bond examiner for the state auditor, announced Friday a reduction of bonded indebtedness of more than \$2,500,000 by the governmental subdivisions of Nebraska in the last two years.

Killed By Train. Meadow Grove, Neb.—Robert Fugh, 80, Meadow Grove pioneer, was struck by a train Friday while crossing Buffalo creek bridge west of here, and was killed instantly.

Rehearing Is Denied. Lincoln, Neb., Aug. 11.—The supreme court today declined to change its recent decision upholding the position of six heirs of the estate of Ida Wecker.

Suffers Broken Back. Emerson, Neb., August 11.—A broken back and a skull fracture were suffered today by Mrs. Agnes Terwilliger, 72, of Quinnessee, Mich., in a car accident near here.

Sunflower Grows Tall At Wisner

A sunflower measuring 71 1/2 feet tall is an unusual specimen at the John B. Smith place in Wisner.

The eastern third of Nebraska will have a splendid corn crop. All corn in eastern Nebraska excepting some of the southern portion, recovered from the threatened injury by drought and high temperatures in July.

The average yield of winter wheat is 11.7 bushels per acre and the production 21,352,000 bushels as compared with 57,431,000 bushels last year and the 1926-30 average of 59,422,000 bushels.

The condition of spring wheat is 61 percent and the production 2,384,000 bushels as compared with 945,000 bushels last year. The crop is poor, but the harvested acreage is considerably larger than that of last year.

Out Crop Is Good. The oat crop is a good one. Yields are exceptionally good in the northeast quarter of the state.

Women on Advisory Council. Lincoln, Neb.—Six northeastern Nebraska women are among 14 prominently identified in republican circles of the state with Mrs. H. C. M. Burgess, who has been named a member of the women's advisory council of the Nebraska republican central committee.

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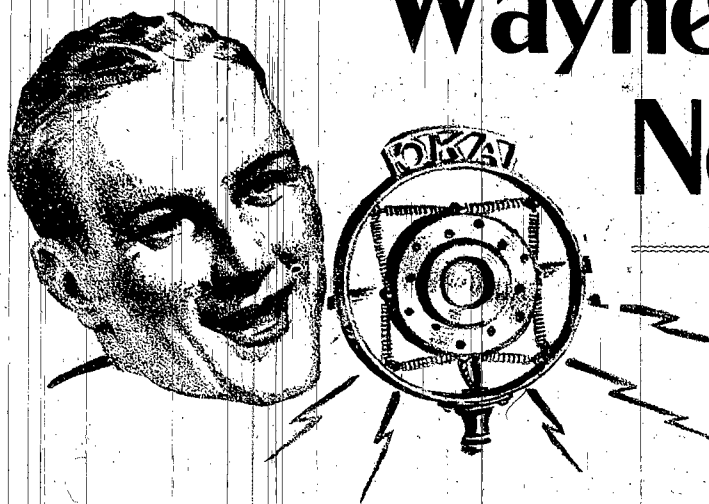

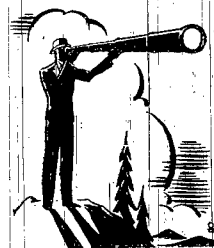
