GRAHAM TO HOLD FORMAL OPENING

New Wayne Plant Will Be Inspected by Public This Friday.

Formal opening of the Wayne plant of the Graham Ice Cream company and the Omaha Cold Storage, which occupies part of H. B. Graham's new building, is set for Friday, September 23, when the public is cordially invited to inspect the new modern structure at First and Pearl streets. H. B. Graham of Omaha, president of the Graham Ice Cream company, will be here to greet visitors. He and his assistants will show the up-to-date plant and the modern mechanical devices. Souvenirs will be distributed and visitors will be treated to ice cream and soda water beverages.

Mr. Graham has made every effort to provide the best possible building for the companies, and he is carrying out the same plan in the opening. He has gone to considerable expense to bring to Wayne for the occasion a new machine which fills paper cups with ice cream in about the same manner that bottling machinery makes soda water. The machine fills a little cup with ice cream and puts on the cap at the rate of about one per second. Several sizes of cups will be filled with ice cream by the machine in the demonstrations Friday.

The Wayne plant will be used as a storage and distribution unit until spring when manufacturing equipment will be installed.

Mr. Graham invites the public to visit the new plant this Friday. He will make the occasion enjoyable and interesting for everyone. Beginning at 9 a. m. the opening will continue through the day and evening. Dancing will start at 10 p. m.

Kenyon Lewis Is Highest in Test

Several of Wayne College Students Make Good English Records.

Scoring 99 percent, that is, making 188 points out of a possible 200, Kenyon Lewis, graduate of the Wayne college high school, took highest honors in the English tests given Wednesday last week under direction of Prof. J. Q. Owen to 320 freshmen of Wayne Teachers College. He places among the highest one percent of 4,000 students who took the tests prepared by the Iowa Research bureau for the purpose of testing English training judgment and alertness. Those having correct answers on more than 50 of the possible 300 are permitted to take college English and the others will take a preliminary course in grammar as preparation Only 57, or about one-sixth of the Wayne group made a low average. Eleanor Reynolds, graduate of St. Joseph high school in Salix, Iowa, placed second in the Wayne test with a score of 98 percent. Elizabeth Lucore of South Sioux City, was third with 96 percent, and Mildred Knapp of Fleming, fourth with 95. Fifth place with an average of 93 percent was attained by Alberta Russell of Grand Island, and Vera Walden of East high school in Sioux City. Ruth Dressler of Brunswick, and Janice May Teed of Wayne college high school, placed sixth with records of 92 percent. Florence Arrabrust of Pilger, Doris Nelson of Wayne college high school and Charlette Swift of Crofton, tied for seventh place with averages of 90 percent.

Former Instructor Opening Studio

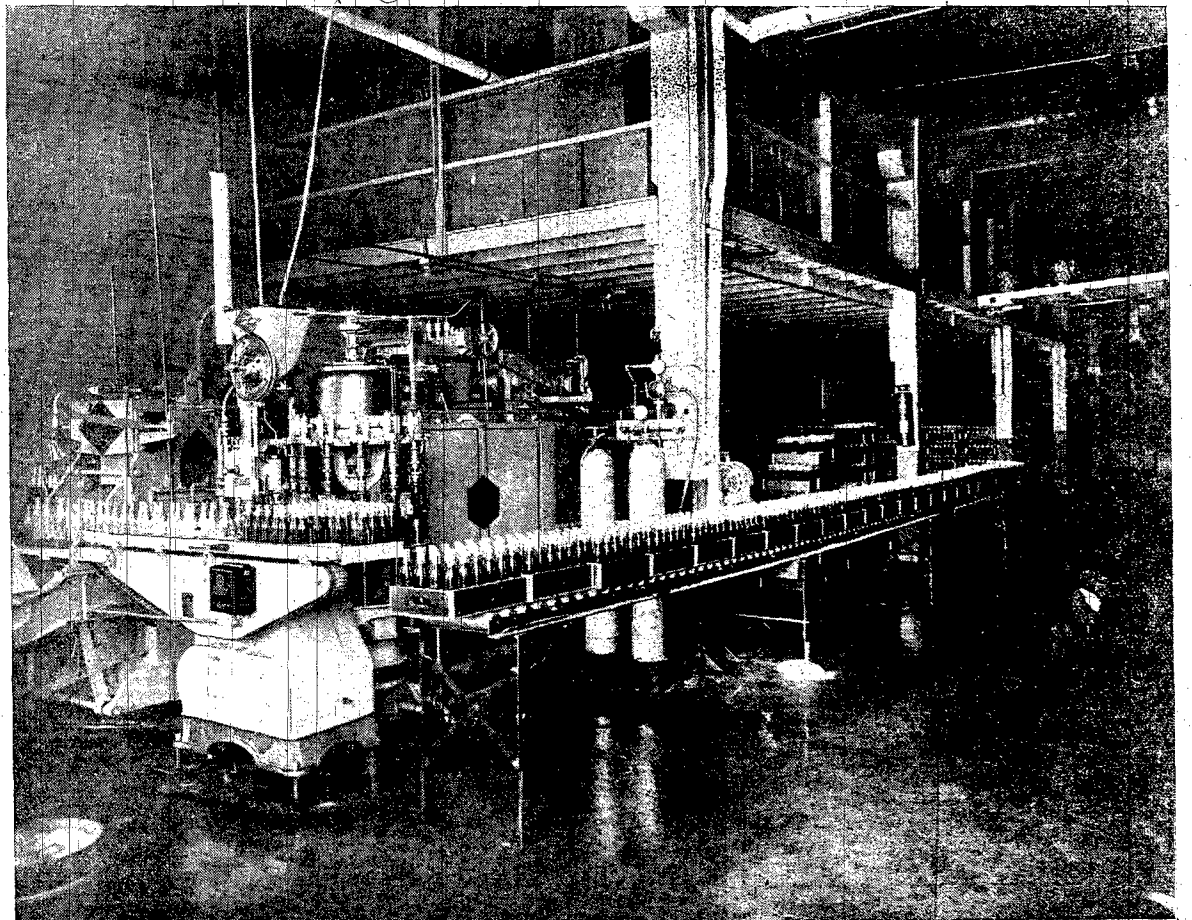

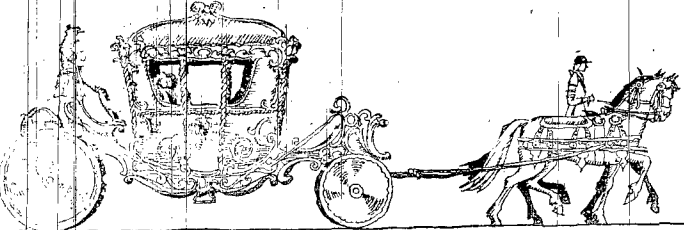
