

At this time neighbors gather his crop and relieve him of such anxiety In the springtime his corn lanted, and later in the season, if he is ound unable to keep ahead, of the weeds in his fields, the crop is cultivated and laid by through mass effort. If a farmer is

by through mass enort. It a farmer is handicapped, his heighbors are quick to join together and give assistance, expect-ing nothing in return but kindly gratitude. Imagine such voluntary and unselfish helpfulness in metropolitan centers where sarest neighbors do not know one anoth , where suspicion and distrust rule, and here a cold, conscienceless battle for a livelihood precludes practice of the Golden Rule. The great city is sophisticated but it is in rural communities where soul and where finest fellowship manifested.

Pledges IN pledging support to the Support coming national administration, the Nebraska Farmer declares itself for sound principles of government state and national programs that the welfare of all without specand for state and vors to any." from the Farmer's editorial;

"As a publication, our interest primarily is in better prices for the products of the farm. We know that there can be no enduring prosperity in this country unless the farmer shares equally in it. We know that nothing is good for our country that is not good for the farmer. Our theory of a return to better times is based upon doing those things for agriculture that will enable it to arise promptly from the burden of depressed prices. The extent to which the government can insure this is always problematical. One thing sure the farmer will benefit greatly from reduced taxes along the entire line and that is something every branch of the government can do."

Lowered LARGE reductions in railway freight rates with one cent per mile for passenger service, is an experiment introduced by the C. St. P. M. & O. line. In this way the company hopes to recover business lost to trucks, busses and privately owned automobiles. Greatest difficulty in the experiment is to persuade persons to quit using their own cars. It will be economy to travel on trains, and it will be done where too great inconvenience does not interfere. But if freight hauling mounts as expected, the experiment will be declared a success. It a success on the C. St. P. M. & O. system, it will doubtless be extended to other lines. And it comes at a time when the saving is most needed by the shipping and traveling public.

Thanksgiving Day Is Anniversary Of Wayne's Worst Fire

Today mayes the 41st anniversary of Wayne's "great fire," for for Thanksgiving day, 1891, 'Rames burst out in the store building at Third and Main Istreets, site of the Palace Cafe, and spread rapidly, soon enveloping the entire half block to the alley on Main street, in a mass of flames. No hydrants, no hose trucks in the early 90's, so the local fire-fighters carried water from two hand-pumped wells on the alley, and the fire took its prey.
