Christmas Observance Among All Centers Around Special Services

Christmas is Christmas the world over, for the same spirit of generosity and brotherliness permeates the Scandinavian countries and neighboring England and Germany, as is found in our own Scandinavian and German colonized Wayne county. And many of the lovely old-world customs have been brought to this country and survive, often in much modified form. Let's ask Mrs. Richard Pinkham how the holidays were spent in her native England. "We had no Thanksgiving," she recalls, "so the Christmas holidays were very important and we spent long time getting ready for them." The house was carefully decorated with satin-leaved holly which is so abundant in the motherland, and bits of mistletoe were tucked in the most unexpected places, waiting for a fair victim. Christmas eve was a night of dances and gaiety, but Christmas morning brought groups of caroling folks to sing those fine old songs under the windows. Everyone went to church, then gathered around the family tree to exchange gifts. Christmas noon was a time of great feasting, with the king of birds usually heading the menu. Day after Christmas was called "boxing day" and brought elaborate pantomimes at all the big theatres, with such favorites as "Babes in the Woods" and "Red Riding Hood." Usually these pantomimes were presented for a month afterwards, and young folks and old went again and again to see the ones which caught their fancy. Mrs. E. Granzquist left her native Norway at the age of 16 to come to this new land, but many parts of the holiday celebration are very vivid in her memories. Christmas preparations began weeks ahead, when the housewives baked holiday goodies in their big open fireplace ovens, scoured their houses with minute care, and hand-dipped candles for the family tree. After the Christmas tree was set up, the tasty cookies, cakes and breads were heaped up around its base for everyone to admire and sample. Always there was a huge round loaf usually baked in a roaster, with crisp-crust bread rooster perched in the center. This loaf was a fine white bread which was baked only at Christmas; every day fare was a coarser brown bread. Christmas morning services were at 6 which can be very early indeed in mid-winter. However everyone, old and young, must go to church, and a special driver with horses and sled came by to gather up the neighbor folks. Bells jingled gaily, and the driver sat high in his seat at rear of sled, cracking his whip and guiding the horses over the snowy ground. The church made a pretty sight at approach. Completely lighted by candles, and garlanded in green evergreen, which grows so plentifully in Norway. Short branches were spread along the aisles to make a veritable carpet, and greens lined the altar. Twin trees were arranged on either side of the altar, with a boy and girl guarding each, and other children of the congregations lined up behind. Christmas carols rang out, and a great peace seemed to fall upon the little group of parishioners. The holiday festivities had only begun with Christmas day, for Norwegians celebrate the entire week, dancing, often masquerading in old clothes and going out to scare their neighbors. Snowfall was heavy, the tall, straight pines were mantled with white, and the fresh, calm air was bracing, not too cold. Mrs. Albin Carlson remembers the Christmas season as one of great preparation in Sweden. The men butchered, the women-folks baked and scrubbed for weeks in advance, scouring their copper kettles to a golden bronze, decking the house with evergreen boughs, often even decorating sheds and stables with the fragrant branches, that the animals might share in Christmas pleasure. Sheds of oats were tied to sticks and thrust into the ground, a holiday dinner for birds, friends, and the family tree, candle-lit, was surrounded by gifts ready for Christmas eve. Swedish farm houses are usually built around a big manor house, and the man folks are always big den to the manor house for Christmas eve dinner, while the children came later in evening for a treat and treat. The manor house was decorated liberally with evergreens, even the exterior being outlined in green branches culled from the heavy forests which abound in Sweden. Christmas day brought heavy dinner, including "julegrout," a special rice pudding dotted with almonds, and "lutefisk," a dried fish which must be bought in advance and soaked thoroughly before serving with creamed sauce or butter. Swedish folks of Wayne county are able to buy this fish at local grocers, and usually include it in their holiday foods. 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Christmas Observance Among All Centers Around Special Services

Christmas is Christmas the world over, for the same spirit of generosity and brotherliness permeates the Scandinavian countries and neighboring England and Germany, as is found in our own Scandinavian and German colonized Wayne county. And many of the lovely old-world customs have been brought to this country and survive, often in much modified form. Let's ask Mrs. Richard Pinkham how the holidays were spent in her native England. "We had no Thanksgiving," she recalls, "so the Christmas holidays were very important and we spent long time getting ready for them." The house was carefully decorated with satin-leaved holly which is so abundant in the motherland, and bits of mistletoe were tucked in the most unexpected places, waiting for a fair victim. Christmas eve was a night of dances and gaiety, but Christmas morning brought groups of caroling folks to sing those fine old songs under the windows. Everyone went to church, then gathered around the family tree to exchange gifts. Christmas noon was a time of great feasting, with the king of birds usually heading the menu. Day after Christmas was called "boxing day" and brought elaborate pantomimes at all the big theatres, with such favorites as "Babes in the Woods" and "Red Riding Hood." Usually these pantomimes were presented for a month afterwards, and young folks and old went again and again to see the ones which caught their fancy. Mrs. E. Granzquist left her native Norway at the age of 16 to come to this new land, but many parts of the holiday celebration are very vivid in her memories. Christmas preparations began weeks ahead, when the housewives baked holiday goodies in their big open fireplace ovens, scoured their houses with minute care, and hand-dipped candles for the family tree. After the Christmas tree was set up, the tasty cookies, cakes and breads were heaped up around its base for everyone to admire and sample. Always there was a huge round loaf usually baked in a roaster, with crisp-crust bread rooster perched in the center. This loaf was a fine white bread which was baked only at Christmas; every day fare was a coarser brown bread. Christmas morning services were at 6 which can be very early indeed in mid-winter. However everyone, old and young, must go to church, and a special driver with horses and sled came by to gather up the neighbor folks. Bells jingled gaily, and the driver sat high in his seat at rear of sled, cracking his whip and guiding the horses over the snowy ground. The church made a pretty sight at approach. Completely lighted by candles, and garlanded in green evergreen, which grows so plentifully in Norway. Short branches were spread along the aisles to make a veritable carpet, and greens lined the altar. Twin trees were arranged on either side of the altar, with a boy and girl guarding each, and other children of the congregations lined up behind. Christmas carols rang out, and a great peace seemed to fall upon the little group of parishioners. The holiday festivities had only begun with Christmas day, for Norwegians celebrate the entire week, dancing, often masquerading in old clothes and going out to scare their neighbors. Snowfall was heavy, the tall, straight pines were mantled with white, and the fresh, calm air was bracing, not too cold. Mrs. Albin Carlson remembers the Christmas season as one of great preparation in Sweden. The men butchered, the women-folks baked and scrubbed for weeks in advance, scouring their copper kettles to a golden bronze, decking the house with evergreen boughs, often even decorating sheds and stables with the fragrant branches, that the animals might share in Christmas pleasure. Sheds of oats were tied to sticks and thrust into the ground, a holiday dinner for birds, friends, and the family tree, candle-lit, was surrounded by gifts ready for Christmas eve. Swedish farm houses are usually built around a big manor house, and the man folks are always big den to the manor house for Christmas eve dinner, while the children came later in evening for a treat and treat. The manor house was decorated liberally with evergreens, even the exterior being outlined in green branches culled from the heavy forests which abound in Sweden. Christmas day brought heavy dinner, including "julegrout," a special rice pudding dotted with almonds, and "lutefisk," a dried fish which must be bought in advance and soaked thoroughly before serving with creamed sauce or butter. Swedish folks of Wayne county are able to buy this fish at local grocers, and usually include it in their holiday foods. During her first year, Mrs. A. C. Thompson was brought to this country by her parents, so her memories of Denmark are naturally negligible, but many of the home-land customs were kept alive in the family, and most fascinating they are, too. Fully three weeks before the 25th of December, Danish wives began preparations, cleaning the house, killing geese and ducks, so everything would be in readiness for a week of holidays. In Denmark, no one works from Christmas to New Year's day, spending the days in visiting and feasting. Wheat is put out for the birds and cared for, and no one must be turned away hungry throughout the season. On Christmas eve the church bells ring, sending its clear, resonant tones out into the crisp light air for two hours preceding services. Again, only candles were used to light the village church. After services everyone went home to prepare for the family tree, which was credited to the unseen Jule Nisser, Danish Santa. One must never forget to cook a bowl of gruel for Jule Nisser, and to set it outside for him—this brought good luck. Everyone joined hands and circled around the gift tree, singing "Holy Night" and other world-wide favorites. Older folks as well as children stayed up until 12 o'clock that evening when they sat down to a midnight lunch. Throughout the week until New Year's day, everyone visited, drank much coffee and partook of the delicious breads and cookies. No one was allowed to leave the house until served. The days up until New Year's eve were sacred; they belonged to celebration of the holy birthday; but New Year's eve brought return to gaiety, and everyone danced and made merry. With passing of New Year's day the holidays were ended and work-a-day tasks began again. It is all very well to be assured that we'll get a new deal, but what a number of us want to know is how we are going to sit in the game without any chips.—Macon Telegraph.
