



On the other hand, the February, report of the National City Bank of New York says that while the president-elect and his party are pledged to sound money, and the senate has voted against remon-etization of silver; "the agitation of these proposals interferes with the establish-ment of confidence." Therefore, this bank is firmly against changing the monebank is firmly against changing the mone-tary standard or in any way weakening the

tary standard of in any way weakening the currency. The report states among other things: "One of the most distinging of all the difficulties is the disorder in world trade and in currency relationships, which dis-rupts the exchange of goods between coun-tries and exerts a constant pressure upon the price levels, of commodities entering international trade. This is an economic problem vital to all countries; and it is in fact a series of separate problems, involv-ing debts, tariffs and trade agreements, fin-ancial policies of governments, and other factors all intricately related. Any of these problems is difficult, and a harmoni-ous treatment of the whole, opening a way back to a common standard of value, ob-viously will require the cooperation of all aspirit of mutual concession and understand-ing."

But quite in opposition to this way of thinking is the view of Henry Wallace, editor of Wallace's Farmer, Des Moines, who favored change in the monetary stand-ard in a talk béfore the Nebraska solons at Lincoln the first of the week. He sug-gested cutting down farm production, re-ducing freight rates, telephone and utility cests, taxes and other fixed charges with controlled inflation. He believes in follow-ing the example of Erigland in junking the gold standard. But he is opposed to is-suing paper money which he says is dan-gerous.

Abraham Lincoln's birthday reminds us Abraham Lincoln's birthday reminds us of the darkest period in American history —a period through which he struggled and suffered to preserve the union. The con-flict over, his life was sacrificed to the re-venge of false appraisal and mistaken no-tion. The union thus saved is now read-justing after another terrible clash of arms, and many injustices spring from the ordeal. Many doing patriotic service are often cru-elly misjudged and their efforts discredit-ed and hindered. The scars of misjunder-standing and prejudice marked the path of Lincoln, and made heavier the burdens of leadership before and since his day.

Below zero weather descended the first of the week, and held the west in the grip of real winter for a few days. Some sec-tions had heavy falls of snow, and wind varying in velocity from 8 to 20 miles an hour caused some drifting. Hereabouts too little snow appeared to impede traf-fic. But the intensity of the cold slowen up every moving creature from human bi-peds to steam engines. The elements were the most severe in three years, ac-cording to weather observers, and they make up in large part for the mild variety experienced during half of December and all of January. all of January.
