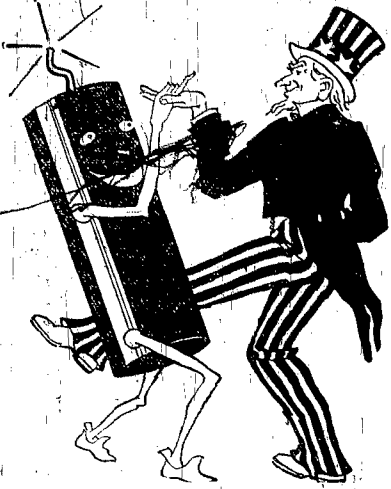






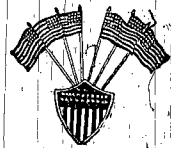

Leisurely Moroccan Life Appeals To Visitor From The Mission Fields

Morocco, land of magnificent buildings, of blue, blue waters and luxuriant gardens, lives in a world of itself, in tempo with civilization of 4,000 years ago, unburied, unwarmed, says Rev. Victor Swanson, who visited here last week-end.

With Rev. Swanson was his son, Marshall, who spent the first 10 of his 17 years in Africa and landed in New York in his tenth year, plunged into a bewildering array of skyscrapers, elevators, bewildering traffic and hurry, hurry, hurry.

Since his first step in Wayne, Rev. Swanson has been in Chicago and in South Carolina, and since Christmas holidays he supplies the Baptist church at Stromberg. But now his thoughts are turning back to colorful Morocco and he hopes to go back soon.

"There's something very fascinating about Eastern life," says the missionary. "There's always plenty of time when you mention hurrying a native will say, 'What for? Why hurry? God is.' Many times Rev. Swanson has made four or five trips for a loaf of bread - the bakery being closed at irregular intervals, of the baking being delayed. There is always more time coming and regularity is unknown. Marketing in Morocco consists of haggling with the native shopkeeper long and heatedly. The shopman always asks twice what the article is worth, so would-be buyers name what that sum and pitch in.
