Surveying on the new Wayne-Plerce highway has been complet-ed from Wayne to a point two and a half miles west, according to Thomas Cunningham of Lincoin a half miles west, according to Thomas Curningham bf Lincoln, engineer, who is in charge. The surveys have been sent to Lincoln for approval and when they are returned grading will start at once. The grading should begin the last of this week or first ofmext. 





workers have returned to jobs in seventeen industrial and business groups during Sep-tember. Eastern manufacturing centers report improved conditions, but hope in the influence of the NRA on better times in the middle west rests largely on what it will do in the east to increase consumption of farm products and thus develop lagging buying power. Factory outputs depend in considerable measure on farm consump-tion to warrant increased manufacturing prices established under the NRA, but this consumption is necessarily delayed until a parity between farm and factory prices is reached.

while the president invites criticism as a way to escape or correct errors, the sec-retary of the American Newspaper Publish-ers association is quoted in an address at Chicago this week as expressing fear that the constitutional guarantee of a free press is in danger of destruction. The secretary fears that organized labor is seeking to control all newspaper branches including a censorship over news. This would of course threaten the end of a free press which is acknowledgedly the great-est safeguard for American freedom. But the privilege of a free press has been enjoyed too long to suffer a serious setback. We suspect the secretary has overdrawn his fears. his fears

A report says the German government proposes to authorize physicians to end the suffering of incurable patients. The re-port also states that both the Lutheran and Catholic churches have offered sharp op-position. We wonder who is qualified to say that one is incurable? Who should presume to say an invalid does not contri-bute useful influence, if nothing more, to society? And if one sright to live is to be determined by an authorized board, what assurance is there that in the course of time the authority would not be abused and that one would not be checked out with-out the ground assumed by the govern-ment? ment?

The Newspaper Association of man-agers meeting in Chicago recently issued a shout to newspapers over the country to raise advertising rates to meet the increas-ed cost of production. Advertising could not be much less no matter how high the rates, but the folly of boosting rates to ad-vertisers who must look for trade volume to a higher price level for farmers, is appar-ent to any rural publisher in the middle west. Rules made to follow in the country must be made with an understanding of the country, and probably metropolitan cen-ters know more about everything else than ters know more about everything else than they do about rural sections.

Dr. A. L.
