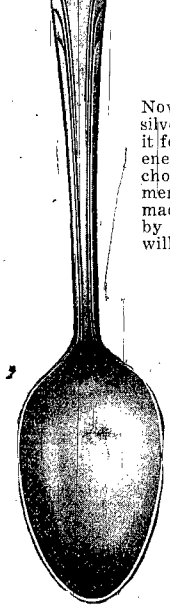

workers have returned to jobs in seventeen industrial and business groups during September. Eastern manufacturing centers report improved conditions, but hope in the influence of the NRA on better times in the middle west rests largely on what it will do in the east to increase consumption of farm products and thus develop lagging buying power.

While the president invites criticism as a way to escape or correct errors, the secretary of the American Newspaper Publishers association is quoted in an address at Chicago this week as expressing fear that the constitutional guarantee of a free press is in danger of destruction.

A report says the German government proposes to authorize physicians to end the suffering of incurable patients. The report also states that both the Lutheran and Catholic churches have offered sharp opposition.

The Newspaper Association of managers meeting in Chicago recently issued a shout to newspapers over the country to raise advertising rates to meet the increased cost of production.

Dr. A. L. Bixby says in his Daily Drift, Lincoln Journal, that Nebraska has more miles of waterway than any other state excepting Montana, and that "these waters can be utilized at a moderate cost for power and irrigation purposes, so that the time may be at hand when there will be no such thing as a crop failure in Nebraska."

The history of inflation does not encourage it as a sound means to recovery, and the president's reluctance to be led far in that direction is reassuring.
