





Farm A FARM strike or any other strike that involves threats and force, is the creature of radicals whose activities are often distinctly harm-ful to the cause espoused. To withhold products from market as a means to raise and steady prices has long been a practice in different branches of human endeavor. However, to try to intimidate all into obe-dience to a strike order, defying orderly processes, largely defeats the purpose sought. But there is the element right here in this city that will egg the farmers on to the establishment of road blockades and violence—and that is the very same ele-ment that loses big strike movements."

The action of Neville called attention of the administra-tion to NRA weaknesses, generally appar-ent to inhabitants of the agricultural area of the middle west. The president's sub-sequent modification of the code to exclude towns under 2,500, with a few exceptions, together with his disapproval of dispropor-tionate increases in manufacturing prices, will encourage farm communities to stick to their tasks and tighten their grips in the pull for recovery.
