

Political THE administration has lately Conflict ranks. The resignation of Dr. O. M. W. Sprague as treasury adviser on account of the president's monetary policy, has been followed by disagreeing notes sounded by Al. Smith, former presidential nominee and former New York governor who took a stand against weakening the American dollar and in favor of immediately returning to the gold standard. Will Rogers who is always encouraging says the ones who know the least about the money question are on a par with those who assume to know the most. Rogers conveys the idea that in the matter of financial policies, there are no inequalities—all are equally ignorant. Sound money advocates have been quoting excerpts from the message of Grover Cleveland who was president during the panicky years from 1893 to 1897.

Senator Nye of North Dakota has issued warning that he will attack the NRA plan as soon as congress convenes in January, and that he will be joined by others. Nye explains (that he voted for the plan, but that since it has been put into practice he is against it. On the other hand, Roger W. Babson, who has plenty of confidence in himself as a business analyst and forecaster, says the NRA has some good points that should be retained.

So, there will be sharp differences of prince and the radical will clash, and probably out of the conflict—out of necessary compromises—will come the adoption of the safe middle course.

Memories of GROVER CLEVELAND who served as president twice, first in 1884, and later in 1893, had trials quite equal to those of the last and the present administrations. The money question gained the spotlight as market paralysis spread over the country during the last Cleveland administration, and President Cleveland took a firm position against the movement for free silver, and in his message to congress December 2, 1883, the president said on that subject:

"All history warns us against rash experiments which threaten violent changes in our monetary standard and the degradation of our currency. The past is full of lessons teaching not only the economic dangers but the national immorality that follows in the train of such experiments. I will not believe that the American people can be persuaded after sober deliberation to jeopardize their nation's prestige and proud standing by encouraging financial nostrums, nor that they will yield to the false allurements of cheap money when they realize that it must result in the weakening of that financial integrity and rectitude which thus far in our history has been so devotedly cherished as one of the traits of true Americanism." of true Americanism.
