Miller and Riggs scored for Peru, and Andrews threw the three excellent passes, one of them for 50 yards, which pulled Peru up from defeat. Chadron and Omaha are tied for first place in the conference and will decide their ratings today. Wayne ranks third, Peru fourth, and Kearney fifth. Wayne's record for the season includes five wins, one loss and two ties.

Federal Loans Will Be On Corn

Two Men Are Appointed To Inspect And Seal Bins In County.

Information reaching the state railway commission indicates that only ear corn in cribs will be eligible for the 45c loan offered by the commodity credit corporation of the federal government, according to G. H. Liggett. Previous information led Nebraska people to believe that both shelled corn and ear corn would be acceptable, but the shelled corn in bins will not be considered.

Since the first step in obtaining the 45c loan is to have the crib inspected, sealed and certified under provision of the Nebraska warehousing law, the state railway commission, which administers the warehousing law, has appointed one or more county inspectors to do the work locally. Those appointed in Wayne county are: Keith Reed and Albert Berry of Wayne.

These inspectors have the application blanks and some additional information. They will be supplied with information about new developments from time to time. G. H. Liggett, emergency agricultural assistant, also has a copy of the application blank in his office at Wayne. He will be glad to answer questions for farmers who want to know more about getting the loans.

The corn must grade No. 4 or better. The crib must have a tight roof and floor and be in sound condition. The loans are open until March 1, 1934, and due August 1, 1934. The corn loan contracts are said to contain provisions so a farmer will not have to have his corn-hog adjustment contract signed up before he gets the corn loan. He does agree, however, to enter into the corn-hog adjustment contract. Corn growers who buy corn to feed and want to borrow on it, must have paid other corn producers 45 cents per bushel or more for it, and must get the seller of the corn to agree to sign up the corn-hog adjustment contract also.

LABOR PROJECTS BEING ARRANGED

State Committee Approval Of Plans For Four Towns Is Secured.

Labor projects to give employment to men in Wayne county are under way and others are planned under the new civil works administration. In a group going to Lincoln Tuesday to get sanction of projects were Mayor Martin L. Ringer, Frank Erickson, Rollie W. Ley and J. J. Ahern. These projects are for work in Wayne, Carroll, Winslow and Hoskins. The same group and W. S. Bressler were in Norfolk Monday when all northeast Nebraska counties were called to meet to discuss with state men projects under the C. W. A. Wayne is planning a sewer extension south on Main street. This would require about 2,500 hours of labor. Carroll is asking funds for labor for improving streets, leveling down vacant buildings, improving the sites, doing drainage work on streets and some improvements at the light plant.

Winslow is asking \$600 worth of work in improving the cemetery at that place.

Hoskins plans street and cleaning projects.

The Wayne group going to Lincoln planned to get sanction so work could go ahead in all the towns at once.

Under the civil works administration Wayne has had about 55 men at work the past few days. Now the number is 25 on shifts of three days a week. The storm sewer from the railroad tracks to Logan creek is being cleaned. Parks and some of the city's vacant lots are being cleaned and trees trimmed. Some streets will be improved.

The city also has shifts of about 12 men at work on each of highways No. 35 and No. 15. In shifts of three days a week this provides work for about 48 men each week on the two roads. The men are fixing shoulders on the roads, shoveling up dirt from the ditches and respraying the gravel on the places fixed.

Grading of the road from Carroll south three miles to highway No. 113 is well under way, this project coming under the same administration. L. C. Gildersleeve reports 65 men and 15 teams on the road. They have graded one mile south on the west side of Carroll and are working in the second mile. The road will extend a mile north of Carroll also.

Building of highway No. 113 from Wayne to Pierce is progressing under the P. W. A. Fresno work has been completed in the third mile and 12 men with 10 teams are now in the second and third miles doing grading.

Grading of the Wakefield-Pender highway is another project under way to provide employment for a number of men.

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Political Conflict THE administration has lately met opposition within its own ranks. The resignation of Dr. O. M. W. Sprague as treasury adviser on account of the president's monetary policy, has been followed by disagreeing notes sounded by Al. Smith, former presidential nominee and former New York governor who took a stand against weakening the American dollar and in favor of immediately returning to the gold standard.

Senator Nye of North Dakota has issued warning that he will attack the NRA plan as soon as congress convenes in January, and that he will be joined by others. Nye explains that he voted for the plan, but that since it has been put into practice he is against it.

So, there will be sharp differences of opinion among members of congress, regardless of party lines, when that body reassembles in January. On public policies, individualists will oppose those inclined to socialism. The conservative and the radical will clash, and probably out of the conflict—out of necessary compromises—will come the adoption of the safe middle course.

Memories of GROVER CLEVELAND Cleveland who served as president twice, first in 1884, and later in 1893, had trials quite equal to those of the last and the present administrations. The money question gained the spotlight as market paralysis spread over the country during the last Cleveland administration, and President Cleveland took a firm position against the movement for free silver, and in his message to congress December 2, 1883, the president said on that subject:

"All history warns us against rash experiments which threaten violent changes in our monetary standard and the degradation of our currency. The past is full of lessons teaching not only the economic dangers but the national immorality that follows in the train of such experiments. I will not believe that the American people can be persuaded after sober deliberation to jeopardize their nation's prestige and proud standing by encouraging financial nostrums, nor that they will yield to the false allurements of cheap money when they realize that it must result in the weakening of that financial integrity and rectitude which thus far in our history has been so devotedly cherished as one of the traits of true Americanism."

The Herald is issued Wednesday morning instead of Thursday morning this week on account of Thanksgiving day when the force will suspend the accustomed grind and try and find a lot of things to be thankful for. Blessings to be recounted will not include much in the way of material benefits—nothing worth mentioning in the way of means to luxury or ease, but a good deal in the way of friendships. The old world is rolling along the same as ever. Nature's wealth is not withheld, nor is the gorgeous sunrise or sunset dimmed by our

struggles out of the economic bog. To complete the suspension of this institution's activities on Thanksgiving, there will be no broadcast from the Herald on that day.

While the lynching of the two kidnapers and murderers of Brooke Hart at San Jose, Calif., is condemned as a bold defiance of law, it is condoned in the hearts of many as a warning to the criminal elements—as a relief from often slowly moving court machinery. Punishing crime by mob violence is not to be approved, though society sometimes revolts, as it has in California, against frequent kidnappings and slayings, deliberately planned and fiendishly carried out to reap a harvest of blood-stained dollars. It is hoped the speeding up of orderly means of justice, now apparent with federal help, will put a check on mob retribution.

Eddie Cantor dispenses a lot of wholesome and stimulating advice. In his radio talk Sunday night he had a conversation with a fellow who felt that he was down and out at the age of 46. He hadn't made a success and was ready to quit. Cantor told him of men who seemed to be failures in the fifties and sixties and still made good and scored outstanding leadership. Cantor's evident idea was that no one's luck is bad enough or his age so far advanced that he should be led to abandon hope. Under stress a fellow feels like a coward to give up and retreat.

William Beckenhauer reports peony plants growing in the yard at his residence and thus acting in a way suggesting the approach of spring rather than impending winter. How much intelligence a peony plant can exercise, Mr. Beckenhauer does not presume to say, though it does seem foolish to him for the plants to renew growth with winter just around the corner. If these plants are as smart as they seem to be, we won't have any winter.

A professor who says he is a Californian and therefore ought to know, has condemned the stories of California gold fields of the early days written by Bret Hart, as purely imaginary. Both old-timers who remember and the newspaper records that have been resurrected, prove beyond a doubt the accuracy of the stories. Professors should be accurate or cease to be professors.

Many of the post cards sent into the country around Wayne asking for information and advice concerning the Herald's radio service have been received, but there are still those who have not responded. Early reports will be appreciated as a future aid.

Roger W. Babson, economy expert, opposes a price-fixing program as economically unsound. He thinks price control would work successfully only under a dictatorship such as exists in Russia, Germany and Italy. Babson's idea may or may not be sound.

The Sioux City Live Stock Record quotes some one as saying that college and university professorships have been improved since educators with socialistic and communistic tendencies have been weeded out and transferred to Washington.

STATE APPROVES WORK PROJECTS

Men In Wayne Are Given Employment That Will Benefit Many.

The civil works project submitted by the city of Wayne was approved by the state committee last Thursday in Lincoln when the proposition was presented by Mayor Martin L. Ringer, Rollie W. Mey, Frank Erleben and J. J. Ahern of the unemployment committee. David Koch of Winside, accompanied the men to Lincoln.

The project will consist of the cleaning, widening and straightening of the drainage ditch from the railroad right of way to Logan creek, also the improvement of city parks, streets and alleys.

The Wayne projects will require approximately 7,000 man hours and at the pay of 40c per hour it amounts to \$2,800. Work started at once and men will be allowed 30 hours of work per week.

All necessary materials and equipment will be furnished by the city of Wayne. The city will also furnish a supervisor.

Wayne County Man Locates With "Magic" Plum Branches

When folks around Wayne county find their wells going dry, or need more water for the stock, they usually send for George Berres. Mr. Berres can make a plum twig, tell him where to dig for water. In all, about 100 wells have been dug under his instruction, and every one has "come through."

"I don't know just why the branch acts the way it does, but I always seem to get water," says Mr. Berres. The procedure? "Well, you use a worked plum branch—a new water sprout is best—and grasp the two short ends with the long branch in the air. When you walk over a water vein, the long branch turns downward so sharply that you can't hold it. Once I had two men hold onto the long end and the branch twisted right out of its bark."

Mr. Berres modestly disclaims any special skill in well-locating, but the fact that he has placed most of the wells in the county testifies to his skill. He can tell if a water vein is strong by the branch's reaction. Ray Farney who lives north of Wayne, can locate wells too, says Mr. Berres, and he can even tell the depth necessary to dig to reach water.

A neighbor showed Mr. Berres the tricks of well-locating many years ago when he needed more water on his farm south of Wayne. Later when the Berres well proved inadequate, Mr. Berres tested out his knowledge with encouraging results. The old well was built on top of the hill and used only for the house, but whenever the wind turned south, strange to say, the well would be dry. The mystic branch pointed downward just fourteen feet from the old well, and here was dug a well which reached water at the same level but has never run dry and is used ten times as much as the other well. Recently Mr. Berres located wells for William Stuttmann and Paul Hiltner, both of Altona vicinity.

Is Long-Time Settler.

Mr. Berres' knowledge of Wayne county has been gleaned over a long period of years for he first sighted this prairie country in the year 1880, and has remained most of these intervening 53 years. The 16-year-old lad, alone, speaking an alien language, must have found this treeless country a sorry contrast to the green, highly-cultivated slopes of his native Germany. No Wayne then, no railroad, and not much work for ambitious young chaps. A year and one-half later, Mr. Berres went to Washington county where farming operations had started, and later came back to Wayne county to purchase a farm four miles south and one-half east of the town, remaining there until 1900 when he bought farm property near Altona. Those very first years in Nebraska Mr. Berres recalls with pleasure.

"It was a great life—a healthy and busy life," he says. And it might be added that these were days to encourage self-reliance, for your early settler in Wayne county did not call the grocery store every morning to order fresh fruits and vegetables brought to the door in a motor car. In those early days before there was a Wayne, the set-

tlers went to Wisner for supplies every two weeks or so, and brought home large quantities of staples. Corn meal mush and pork were the main articles of diet, the farmers raising their own hogs, butchering and curing the meat. Beef was practically unknown on the pioneer's table—a milk cow or two and a few hogs made up the usual livestock holdings. Sometimes the settlers had small gardens but as a rule they lived on staples. No canned fruit in their pantries but plenty of dried apricots and the like which could be stewed up for sauces.

Took Came To Mill.
Few persons know that there once existed a sugar mill just two miles east of Altona. The settlers raised their own cane and took it to the mill, then cooked their own syrup. Sometimes a family would put away a 50-gallon barrelful for its winter use, the syrup serving as a spread in place of the jams and jellies we eat today.

The journey to Wisner was long and tiring for roads were few and poor, only the Star Mail route from Wisner to LaPorte having bridges. Cutting their own road would force the streams at advantageous points and lumber slowly to town in their heavy wagons, returning laden with necessities.

Mr. Berres' hardships and pleasures in this youthful country were shared by his wife, the former Miss Louise Greenwald of Wayne, and their four children. Miss Bertha Berres, George Berres, Jr., both of Wayne, Mathilda, now Mrs. Herbert Bergt of Altona, and Miss Hildegard Berres who teaches at Chadron, native Wayne countians. The Berres family now lives in Wayne, but Mr. Berres continues with his farm at Altona, and spends most of his days there.

The town of Altona came into being after the gangling Wayne had passed infancy and entered the long-pants stage. At one time Altona boasted several places of business, including the present Fred Hilpert store which originally was the Farmers' Co-operative store, operated by the Dave Bahdes, another general store belonging to George F. Thies, a cousin of William Thies who now lives near Altona, a machine shop run by W. F. Assenheimer, a hall which originated with the Sons of Herman and which sheltered many of the social gatherings and dances of early days, the Hogrefe blacksmith shop, and a grey stone bank. Most of these buildings have since burned for fires meant sure destruction in the early times. The bank which was headed by "Jabe" Gibson of Norfolk with Frank Erleben as vice-president, and George Berres and Robert Roggenbach, sr., as board members, paid out almost entirely several years ago, and has since been used for storage. The machine shop has been turned into a dwelling, and only Fred Hilpert continues in business. With the development of graveled highways and quickened traffic, Altona has suffered the fate of many other towns and developed into a trading post on the highway, but when pioneering folks first settled in that vicinity, the infant town served them, and served them well.

Took Came To Mill

Few persons know that there once existed a sugar mill just two miles east of Altona. The settlers raised their own cane and took it to the mill, then cooked their own syrup. Sometimes a family would put away a 50-gallon barrelful for its winter use, the syrup serving as a spread in place of the jams and jellies we eat today.

Is Long-Time Settler

Mr. Berres' knowledge of Wayne county has been gleaned over a long period of years for he first sighted this prairie country in the year 1880, and has remained most of these intervening 53 years. The 16-year-old lad, alone, speaking an alien language, must have found this treeless country a sorry contrast to the green, highly-cultivated slopes of his native Germany. No Wayne then, no railroad, and not much work for ambitious young chaps. A year and one-half later, Mr. Berres went to Washington county where farming operations had started, and later came back to Wayne county to purchase a farm four miles south and one-half east of the town, remaining there until 1900 when he bought farm property near Altona. Those very first years in Nebraska Mr. Berres recalls with pleasure.

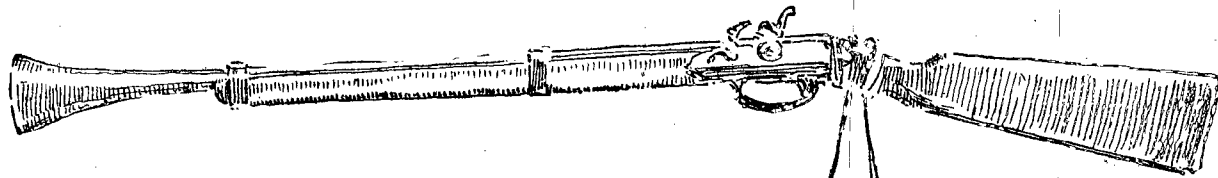

Chocolate Sundae Pie.

1 cup Northfield unsweetened canned milk
1-2 cup water
1-4 teaspoon nutmeg
3 eggs
1-2 cup sugar
1 tablespoon gelatine soaked in 3 tablespoons water
1 teaspoon vanilla
1-2 teaspoon salt
Heat milk, water and nutmeg in double boiler. Separate eggs. Mix egg yolks, sugar and salt until light color and pour into milk, cooking until quite thick. Remove from fire and add gelatine which has just started to set, also vanilla. When cool beat with rotary beater and then add egg whites beaten. Place in baked pie shell. When ready to serve place over pie a cup of cream whipped and sprinkle top with grated unsweetened chocolate.

1-1/3 cup flour
1-2 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons baking powder
1-2 cups milk
4 tablespoons fat (oil)

Beat eggs and mix all wet ingredients together. Mix all dry ingredients together and add to the wet. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites last. Put about 5 tablespoons of batter in heated iron and sprinkle with 1-4 cup grapenuts before putting down the upper part of iron. Allow 4 or 5 minutes for each waffle. Serve with maple syrup or honey.

Cocoa Sponge Cake.
(By Miss Ruth Freeman)
70 egg yolks
8 tablespoons cocoa
1-2 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons lemon juice
2 cups sugar
1-1/2 cups flour
10 egg whites
Beat egg yolks until thick, add salt, sugar, cocoa and lemon juice. Sift flour, measure and sift again. Fold into egg mixture. Carefully fold in egg whites which have been whipped until stiff. Pour in to an ungreased pan and bake in slow oven (325°) for 1-1/2 hours.

1-2 pound prunes
2 cups cold water
1 cup sugar
1-8 teaspoon salt
1-inch piece stick cinnamon
1-1/3 cups boiling water
