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Against Mob Law

IN supporting lynch law, Governor Rolph of California, draws fire from many quarters that look with horror on consequences to society if infuriated mobs were permitted to determine guilt and mete out punishment. As a citizen of California, Herbert Hoover, retired from the nation's leadership, broke silence long enough to rebuke the governor, making this comment among others:

"The issue here is plain and not to be obscured. . . . The governor has been advocating lynch law. It is a subversion of the very spirit of organized society. It is un-American, and it is a reflection on the state of California."

The Omaha World Herald applauds the Hoover position, and concludes with this criticism:

"Governor Rolph may rant till he is apoplectic, he may pettifog till he is hoarse, but he cannot escape the crushing force of that stern indictment.

"One hopes, and may well believe, that Mr. Hoover is right in saying that Governor Rolph's conduct as mob-master and mob-champion is not supported by the people of California. And the best evidence that this is true would be afforded by early action for his impeachment or recall. Then, indeed, would California have taught a lesson to the nation."

National Policies

WHEN a publication voices opposition to one part of the national program, it does not necessarily follow that it is opposed to all parts. The Nebraska Farmer explains that while it does not agree with the NRA plan, it does favor some of the other parts of the recovery program. That publication particularizes in this way:

"We have given a large amount of space to the Agricultural Adjustment program and we have advised farmers to take advantage of it in every way that they think it would be profitable to them.

"Currently, we think the administration is acting wisely in putting four million men to work at public works rather than keeping them on a dole. We gave our endorsement to the 30 million dollars that was to be spent for the purchase of agricultural products with which to feed and clothe the dependent people."

Encouraging Observation

THE Omaha Journal-Stockman breathes courage into newspaper ranks by quoting this observation from one whom it terms a wise old business man:

"The value of your local newspaper to the success of your business cannot be overestimated. It's worth all the support and co-operation you can give it. For the

newspaper is a mirror reflecting the life of the community in which you and your store have an important part. Your advertisement is the reflection of your store in the mirror. Everybody sees it there. If it is not there, the mirror is dark where your store should be. You are there but you cannot be seen. Your store is open for business as usual but 'out of sight out of mind.' To keep in step with the progress of your community, to get your share of business, you must advertise regularly. Take your newspaper publisher into your confidence; he can give you valuable assistance. Establish an advertising budget. Plan a regular schedule for your advertising. It's a policy that is followed by the most successful stores; it's an idea that will be profitable for you."

Ancient Greece produced some wise old birds. Philosopher Pythagoras said: "The wise man should be prepared for everything that does not lie within his control." Philosopher Socrates made this remark: "The way to make ourselves admired is to be what we expect to be thought."

In a current magazine a newspaper man, experienced as a foreign correspondent, presents an article showing from facts gathered in Germany, what would happen to citizens of the United States if the country were ruled by a dictator. It is a startling story and makes one who is used to freedom, recoil at thought of almost unlimited power exercised by one man.

"It has not been the products of the small, one-family farms that created existing surpluses," says the Omaha Journal-Stockman. "It has been the production of bonanza farmers, commercial farmers with no interest in the land beyond the crops the soil will produce. Insistence on reduced production by these wholesale farmers may be logical and wise. Farming was never meant to be a purely commercial business and the sooner this is realized, the sooner agricultural conditions are likely to improve."

It would help get rid of the depression if we could devote the brief pre-Christmas season to thoughts of generous good will rather than to contemplating the hobgoblins of economic fear. When a fellow gets to figuring out what he can do to lighten the burden of the other fellow and what he can add to the good cheer of his soul, he puts elasticity and courage into his own footsteps. The Christmas season is a favorable time to sweep aside gloomy or ugly thoughts, and get in tune to coax the world back to mutually helpful relationships.

Dictatorship in Germany has ruled against the old testament, and religious differences have developed sharply as a result. It would seem that a government would have plenty to attend to without trying to define a person's religious belief or trying to regulate his mode of worship. Whether one believes in the divine origin and infallibility of both the old and new testaments, of either or neither, his religious conviction should be considered a personal privilege of no importance to anyone but himself, and should be stoutly guaranteed against arbitrary interference. Even a bold dictatorship should have sense enough to permit religious freedom.

AN OBSERVATION.

Writing from his winter abode in Phoenix, Arizona, to his Hartington Herald, Editor F. D. Stone reports much dissatisfaction over the working of the NRA. In his travels to the west and on arriving at his destination he made careful inquiry and study of the question. He found much aversion to the plan among both employers and employees with no stimulus to recovery. He says economic conditions are worse at Phoenix than they were a year ago. However, the area of which Phoenix is the center, is stimulated by prospect of a federal expenditure of \$19,000,000 for a huge irrigation system to bring under cultivation 35,000 acres suitable for growing citrus fruits. Editor Stone mentions the apparent incongruity of speeding production in one section and curtailing production in another. It is undoubtedly a fact, as Editor Stone suggests, that the NRA has not been directly helpful—if indeed it has not been detrimental—to recovery in the west, but it has increased employment and strengthened business in the east, as reported, the beneficial influence will in time be felt here and gradually on west to the Pacific ocean. Time will tell.

Our economic condition is like a vehicle trying to travel on different sized wheels, all out of alignment, all out of harmony. In the desperate attempt to make adjustments, we balance one thing and unbalance another. Millions spent to increase production in one section and other millions spent to reduce production in another, with no appreciable increase in values, tend to disturb confidence. Public works relief plans to hasten employment will put considerable money into circulation, but they need to be augmented by more liberal investing by private capital. Experimenting with the currency is doubtless one influence that has kept private money in hiding. When persons who are supposed to know the most about the money question disagree over the course pursued and accordingly issue sharp warnings, individuals with savings fearfully lie down and let the administration struggle along. People are about out of everything. They [would] have junked a lot of things from garages to automobiles long ago if they were not fearful of the future. Houses need new garbs of paint, many repairs and new furnishings. Everything has been neglected to await recovery, whose recovery is doing the same thing—waiting for revived buying. Since we are here with no better place to go, with everything we have or hope to have dependent on the government, we can best safeguard the future by liberating capital and doing now things contemplated for the future. Capital is sensitive to uncertainty, but if it will come out of retirement and help recovery, there will be less uncertainty.

Funds Available For School Work

Rural Districts May Have Money For Improving Property Now.

Under the federal civil works program funds are available for improvements at rural schools, according to word received by County Superintendent Pearl E. Sewell this week.

School painting, electrical wiring, paper hanging, roof repairs, school furniture repairs, improvement of playgrounds and equipment and modernization of sanitary facilities are among the improvements suggested. Funds may be used, Miss Sewell is informed, for materials and labor. State Supt. Charles Taylor interprets the ruling to mean that rural schools may put in new school foundations, repair chimneys, grade and level grounds, build new toilets or construct new inside toilets and cess pools, repair wells and windmills, improve the interior or exterior of the schools.

Miss Sewell has sent word to school boards of the county. Application for funds for such projects will be made with her or with the Civil Works administration.

Liggett Gives Information About Corn Loan And Corn-Hog Plan.

Many people seem confused between the entire corn-hog reduction program and the corn loan feature of R. G. H. Liggett, emergency agricultural assistant, says.

The only connection between the corn loan and the corn-hog plan is that the man who takes 45c loan on his warehouse corn agrees at the same time to sign the corn-hog reduction contract and cut his corn acreage 20 percent and his hog numbers 25 percent.

Copies of the corn-hog reduction contract are not yet approved in Washington. None of the Iowa farmers have seen copies of it.

Nebraska officials have been assured by the corn-hog section at Washington that Nebraska will receive the official copies of the corn-hog plan material as quickly as any other state.

Miss Laura E. Lyons Writes From West

Miss Laura E. Lyons of Long Beach, Calif., writes the Herald reporter November 29 as follows:

"As far as I know the Wayne contingent here is well. May Chace Miller is the only one I have seen for some time.

"It is very windy and threatening rain. We have only had two light showers since October 30 when we had quite a good one. It was so foggy at 7 Friday morning that I could not see a five-story building a block away when on my way to work.

"The U. S. frigate, 'Old Ironsides,' which lay in this harbor during the March 10 earthquake, was sent north for several months and returned in October. I was glad to board it. The sides are really not iron but wood and it is tiny in comparison with the battleships of today.

"We still have slight tremors occasionally. The one October 2 was the worst since March 10. No appreciable damage was done here but some in Los Angeles. Bonds were just voted for school buildings. All sessions are being held in bungalows.

"Our Methodist church celebrated its reopening, also the 50th anniversary of religious gatherings. It was interesting to hear the old timers tell of Methodist camp meetings which were held a few weeks each year. The first congregation had seven members and a little church was built in 1833."

Mrs. Caroline Wenke of Bloomfield, died November 22 at the age of 82.

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Recipes

Savory Stuffing 2 quarts dry bread crumbs 3-4 cup fat, butter and turkey fat 1 small onion, chopped 1-2 cup chopped parsley 1 pint chopped celery 2 teaspoons salt 1 to 2 teaspoons savory seasoning Pepper to taste

Giblet Gravy Simmer the giblets (liver, gizzard and heart) and the neck in 1 quart of water for about an hour. Drain the giblets and chop them fine. If there is too much fat on the drippings in the roaster, skim off some of the excess fat, and leave about 1-2 cup. Into these pan drippings, stir 6 level tablespoons of flour. Then gradually add the cool broth and enough more cold water to make a thin smooth gravy. Cook for 5 minutes, add the chopped giblets and season to taste with salt and pepper.

Scalloped Salmon 1 pound can salmon (2 cups) 2 tablespoons butter 2 tablespoons flour 1-1 1/2 cups milk 3-4 teaspoon salt 1 cup buttered bread crumbs Break the salmon into pieces and remove the bones. Prepare a sauce of fat, flour, milk, and salt. Place a layer of the salmon in the bottom of a greased baking dish, add some of the sauce, then another layer of salmon, and so on until all the ingredients are used.

Broiled Canned Peaches Drain halves of canned peaches from the syrup, place in a shallow baking dish, pit side up, pour over them a small quantity of melted butter, and add a very little salt. Broil under a flame or bake in the oven until the peaches are hot through and lightly browned. Serve hot with the meat course or as dessert.

Corn Fritters 1 3-4 cups sifted soft-weather flour 2 teaspoons baking powder 3-4 teaspoons salt 1 cup liquid, either juice from canned corn or milk, or the two mixed 1 egg 1 cup drained canned corn 1 tablespoon melted fat Mix the flour, baking powder, and salt. Mix the juice from the canned corn, or milk, or whatever liquid is used, the egg after it has been beaten slightly, and the canned corn. Stir this liquid mixture gradually into the dry ingredients. Add the melted fat. If the corn is very moist, even after the liquid has been drained from it, more flour may be needed. Dried corn which has been soaked and cooked until tender may also be used.

Fruit Cake. Mrs. Louis J. Kramer, Fairacres Farm, Winside, Neb. 1 pound butter 1 pound brown sugar 12 eggs 1 cup molasses or sorghum 1 pound flour 4 teaspoons cinnamon 4 teaspoons allspice 1 grated nutmeg 1-4 teaspoon soda 3 lb. seedless raisins 3 lb. currants 3-4 lb. citron 1-2 lb. each lemon and orange

1-2 lb. almond nut meats 1 lb. English walnut meats 1 cup grape juice 1-4 lb. candied cherries 1-4 lb. candied pineapple 1 lb. dates 1 lb. figs 1 tablespoon hot water Cream butter, add sugar gradually and beat hard, separate eggs and beat yolks till thick and lemon colored, add to creamed sugar add 2-3 of the flour (using balance of flour to dredge fruit) mixed with spices and sifted, add fruit which has been chopped, grape juice and the whites of the eggs beaten till stiff and dry and lastly add soda dissolved in the hot water mix thoroughly. Bake in large wooden cheese box lined with 2 thicknesses of brown paper for about 6 hours in a very slow oven.

Gingerbread.

(Mrs. Louis J. Kramer) 2 eggs 2-3 cup lard 1 cup boiling water 3 cups flour 1 cup molasses 1 cup sugar 1 teaspoon ginger 2 teaspoons cinnamon 2 teaspoons soda Four boiling water on lard and molasses, add sugar, let cool slightly, then add other ingredients. Pour in greased pan and bake in moderate oven.

Cocoa Cake.

(Mrs. Louis J. Kramer) 2 eggs 2-3 cup lard 1 cup boiling water 3 cups flour 1 cup molasses 1 cup sugar 1 teaspoon ginger 2 teaspoons cinnamon 2 teaspoons soda Four boiling water on lard and molasses, add sugar, let cool slightly, then add other ingredients. Pour in greased pan and bake in moderate oven.

1 cup sugar 1 egg 1 teaspoon soda 1 rounding tablespoon shortening 1 cup sour milk 1-4 cups flour 2 tablespoons cocoa 1 teaspoon vanilla Mix sugar, shortening and cocoa till well blended, add egg and beat well, add sour milk, soda and flour, beat well, add vanilla, pour in greased pan and bake in moderate oven.

Plum Pudding.

(Mrs. Louis J. Kramer) 1 1-2 cups chopped suet 1 1-2 cups seedless raisins 2 cups chopped dates 1-4 lb. orange peel chopped 1-4 lb. lemon peel chopped 1 cup walnut meats 1 1-2 cups dry bread crumbs 1 1-2 cups brown sugar 1 1-2 cups flour 1 1-2 cups grape juice 1 teaspoon salt 1 1-2 teaspoon cinnamon 3-4 teaspoon cloves 3-4 teaspoon nutmeg 9 eggs Separate eggs and beat yolks till thick and lemon colored, then slowly add sugar, suet, and grape juice, add bread crumbs and flour mixed with spices, save flour enough to dredge fruit, add fruit and nut meats and last add egg whites beaten stiff, put in greased coffee cans, and steam 6 hours with lids on.
