Former Negro Slave. After 10 years of dispute, the es-tate of George Mattingly, former negro slave, was settled in favor of the Mattingly heirs, several of whom live in this county. Mr. Mat-tingly died in Butler county in 1924, leaving an estate valued at \$150,000, which now has shrunken to about \$20,000. He left farm pro-perty near David City, willing \$10,-000 to Joseph Wattingly or to his heirs. Joseph was dead when the negro died in 1924, and his children pressed their claims to the estate through J. E. Brittain. There were many other claimants, and several legal contests were heard in Butler county, as well as in the Nebraska supreme court, before final settle-ment of last week. Charles Mat-tingly, grandfather of the two, was a white man. George's grandmoth-er was a negro and Joseph's was a white woman, so the local families are descendants of the white branch of the family. Joseph Mattingly lived on the Doubd City form during the head dy.
